Agricultural Meeting.

The Directors of the Richmond Hill and Yonge St. Agricultural Society met in the Lorne Hall on afternoon of March 4th. The president in the chair. Present—Messrs. H. Q. St. George, T. F. McMahon, J. Palmer, F. Jackes, B. Redditt, W. Atkinson, W. H. Pugsley, R. Elliott, J. H. Sanderson and Secretary. Minutes of last meeting were adopted. Concert committee reported progress. The following executive committee was appointed: T. Lloyd, W. H. Pageley, D. Lynet, J. Slater, W. H. Clubine, B. Redditt, J. H. Sanderson, T. Boynton, F. Jackes, W. Herrin, J. Palmer, R. Elliott, W. Atkinson. The following were appointed to solicit subscriptions: Markham—D. Lynet, J. Slater; Vaughan—W. H. Clubine, T. F. McMahon; Richmond Hill—President, J. H. Sanderson; Toronto and elsewhere—W. H. Pugsley, J. Palmer, and Secretary. Executive will meet on 18th March. Meeting then adjourned till first Saturday in April.

The Canadian Order of Foresters is a Fraternal Benevolent Society, incorporated in 1879 and registered under the Insurance Corporations Act 1892, of Ontario. The objects of the Society are to furnish its members with Sick and Funeral Benefits and an Insurance of one or two thousand dollars. The payments for these benefits range from about one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per month, according to the age of the member and the amount of the insurance carried. The membership is composed of men only, and when admitted they must be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. The present number of members is over 16,000, and the Society has a cash surplus on hand for the payment of the Insurance of over \$215,000, \$50,000 of which is in Dominion of Canada Bonds, and the balance is invested in the best monetary institutions of the Dominion. In addition to this, the local Courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the Sick and Funeral Benefits. The High Secretary of the Order is Mr. Thomas White of Brantford, and it is expected that a Court of this popular and purely Canadian Society will shortly be organized here.—(Adv.)

Sad Case of Suicide.

The village and surrounding neighborhoods were shocked on Monday last when the news spread abroad that Robert Graham, a highly respected citizen, had committed suicide by hanging himself in his own stable. The unfortunate man had been melancholy for some time past, but no one supposed he would think of committing such a rash act. On Monday morning he got up rather early telling his wife he could not rest in bed. After dressing himself he went out but shortly afterwards returned to the bed-room. He tucked the bed-clothes tightly around his wife, who was in very delicate health, saying he felt grieved for her, and after kissing her again went out. It would appear that he then went to the stable, and committed the rash deed in the hay loft. It was probably ten o'clock in the forenoon when his lifeless form was found by some of the neighbors. No inquest was necessary, but it appears to have been a clear case of temporary insanity. Deceased had been troubled in his mind for some time on account of having had to pay a note of several hundred dollars which note he claimed he never knowingly signed. His contention was that he had been asked to put his signature to a paper merely to identify another party in a bank. The affair ended in a lawsuit, and the party afterwards threatened Mr. Graham with damages for defamation of character. He was of a quiet, retiring disposition, and would not knowingly harm anybody. The affair is most unfortunate, and the deepest sympathy is felt for his greatly afflicted wife and relatives. Funeral from the residence, Richmond street, at 1 o'clock this afternoon, to the Maple cemetery.
