## MR. WALLACE WON'T RETRACT.

We are forced to admire the manly and courageous stand taken by Mr. N. C. Wallace, Comptroller of Customs, in defending his recent utterances at Kingston. Before the motion was put proposing to censure him for his remarks, Mr. Foster, leader of the government, and others, foolishly endeavored to show that nothing was meant further than to express sympathy with the anti-Home Rulers of Ulster, and, if necessary, to assist them constitutionally. The accusers, however, insisted that the speech was treasonable, and gave the accused every opportunity to explain or modify his statements. Mr. Wallace replied that what he said he meant, and that he had not one word to take back.

The Orange Sentinel and other Conservative papers are still making themselves ridiculous by telling their readers just what Mr. Wallace meant, when the latter declines to accept them as his commentations.

We cannot commend Mr. Wallace for his recent utterances, as such are intended to create insurrection, but his stand is far more manly than those who would wish him to appear in a false position. With reference to loyalty Mr. Wallace is like too many people. As long as they and their friends are in power their loyalty to the Queen is excessive, but when in the minority they immediately talk of a change of allegiance. There have been times even in the history of Canada when our people could not submit to arbitrary measures. But surely in case that Ireland is granted a measure of Home Rule, it will be only fair to give it a trial, and not talk of taking up arms before the measure is passed.

## SHOW YOUR COLORS.

At a recent meeting of the Newmarket town council, a petition prepared by the Dominion Alliance was presented, asking the council to petition the Ontario Legislature to take a plebescite on the prohibition question. A resolution favoring the plebescite was carried, and the Mayor was instructed to sign the petition. Deputy Reeve Woodcock who voted against the motion had a letter in the Era last week, and gave his reasons for the position he took. As will have been noticed by the minutes of the last council meeting in this place a similar petition was read by the Clerk, but the council took no action whatever. We think that this was not treating the question fairly, and that a vote should have been taken. If the members are in favor of a plebescite let them say so; if opposed to it let them acknowledge it as Deputy Reeve Woodcock did.

Mr. John Charlton, M.P. for South Norfolk, is one of the most useful members in the House of Commons. His vote and influence are always on the side of morality, and his excellence of character cannot fail to have a good effect on his fellow-workers in parliament. There are times, however, when, we believe, he is a little extreme in his anxiety to "Shun even the appearance of evil." This was the case on Friday night last, when he moved an amendment to the criminal code which permits a court to receive a verdict from a jury on a Sunday. Had the amendment carried it might have been the means on various occasions of doing an injustice to jurymen by keeping them

locked up from Saturday night till Sunday morning, in cases where they could not arrive at a verdict before twelve o'clock, midnight. Either this might happen, or otherwise the verdict might be arrived at with undue haste. Mr. Charlton is thoroughly in earnest in his efforts to compel people to respect the Sabbath, but in this case we believe it is choosing the "least of two evils" by allowing men the privilege of attending to their regular devotional services, than to keep them under lock and key.

The Newmarket Era of last week contained the following paragraph: "The World intimates that a big deal is on the tapis between the Toronto Street Railway Co. and the Metropolitan Railway Co., by which the line of the latter will become the property of the former. Now the folly of the majority in the County Council, who granted the extended franchise, is becoming apparent: thousands of dollars lost."

Will the Era kindly explain how the county will lose "thousands of dollars" in case the deal referred to above does take place. We fail to see the proof of the statement.

The Ontario Legislature will open in the new Parliament Buildings on Tuesday next, the 4th of April. His Honor, the Lieut-Governor will arrive at 3 o'clock. Admission to the floor of the house and to the galleries will be by special invitation card only. Immediately following the official opening the Lieut-Governor and Mrs. Kirkpatrick will hold a public reception in the chamber. Owing to the general desire to inspect the new buildings, the entire block will be opened until 10 o'clock at night.

The Mail insists that as Hon. John Costigan voted censure on Mr. N. C. Wallace, the former should resign his position in the Cabinet. In concluding a lengthy article it says: "Certainly there can be no mistake in appointing a first-class Irish Catholic to fill Mr. Costigan's place."

A motion by Mr. McLean, M. P. for Last York, was adopted in the House of Commons a week or two ago favoring a nickle coinage in this country in place of the present copper coinage. It was agreed in the House that the new coinage would be cleaner than the old, besides it would be the means of giving encouragement to a native industry.

until shame is benumbed and the serpent has captured his bird.

**EIGHTLY.**—It is harm because the church as a whole, and some churches in particular, have through their representative men and courts condemned as dangerous and subvertive of the highest type of piety.

Some churches have not formulated laws against the pleasure dance, but all churches ranging from the church of Rome to the Salvation Army, have hurled their condemnation against this shrouded evil.

**NINTHLY.**—It is harm because the pleasure dance is put, by the Apostle Paul, in the list of sins which exclude men from the Kingdom of God. The word "dance" is found twice in the New Testament and is translated "reveling," in Gal. 5: 21; and I. Peter, 4: 3. No where in the Bible is pleasure dancing spoken of with approbation. No where did the Jewish people dance promiscuously with the approval of the Bible teacher. I have now given briefly a few of the many reasons which might be given against the pleasure dance, falsely called by some "recreation." As we would not keep company with one who made his living by dancing, we would avoid the association and influence of those who do it only for the transient enjoyment which leaves behind an aching void and pungent suffering. I know that some will dance no matter what reasons are given, or dangers pointed out, but there are those who will listen to words of advice and resist the subtle solicitation of those whose only popularity is gained by figuring before a class who knows as much about the fine arts of time and movement as they do about the religion they blight.

I cannot close without expressing my contempt for those who draw church members into the violation of church laws and then laugh at their mortification.
