Easter at the Hospital for Sick Children.

We ask the readers of THE LIBERAL to kindly remember the Easter offering for the above-named institution. We call to mind with much pleasure the very hearty response made to an appeal in these columns for this offering last Easter, and feel confident of similar results on this occasion. It has been said that "Charity is the golden chain that links earth with heaven," and surely the sweets of all charities is that which cares for little sick children. Our village children and young people who so liberally brought their gifts last Easter realized fully that "It is more blessed to give than to receive." How true it is that "Charity for suffering, opens in each heart a little heaven." Donations of eggs, apples, jellies, canned fruit, cake, toys, pictures, books, &c., &c., will be thankfully received at THE LIBERAL office on Friday morning. These will be carefully packed and sent to the hospital on Saturday. We are confident that many suffering little ones will have their Easter morning gladdened by the offering sent by the children of Richmond Hill. We might add that where friends send canned fruit the jars will be returned.

The Canadian Order of Foresters is a Fraternal Benevolent Society, incorporated in 1879 and registered under the Insurance Corporations Act 1892, of Ontario. The objects of the Society are to furnish its members with Sick and Funeral Benefits and an Insurance of one or two thousand dollars. The payments for these benefits range from about one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per month, according to the age of the member and the amount of the insurance carried. The membership is composed of men only, and when admitted they must be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. The present number of members is over 16,000, and the Society has a cash surplus on hand for the payment of the Insurance of over \$215,000, \$50,000 of which is in Dominion of Canada Bonds, and the balance is invested in the best monetary institutions of the Dominion. In addition to this, the local Courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the Sick and Funeral Benefits. The High Secretary of the Order is Mr. Thomas White of Brantford, and it is expected that a Court of this popular and purely Canadian Society will shortly be organized here.—(Adv.)

Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Upper Canada Branch Bible Society was held in the Lecture Room of the Presbyterian church last Thursday evening. There was a good attendance, and more than the usual interest was taken in the proceedings. Rev. Dr. Percival, who acted as chairman, stated that the financial returns so far as heard from were quite satisfactory, but that as one section had not been heard from, the financial report would be published in a week or two in THE LIBERAL. It was decided by the meeting to divide the money as last year, viz., half to the Upper Canada Bible Society, and half to the British and Foreign Bible Society. The following officers were then elected: President—Rev. Dr. Percival; Vice-Pres.—Rev. J. C. Speer; Sec'y-Treas.—J. E. Clubine; Depository—T. F. McMahon; Committee—Rev. J. H. Oliver, Wm. Atkinson, Wm. Harrison, Dr. Wilson, Dr. Langstaff, T. Newton, A. G. Elliott. Excellent speeches were then given by Rev. Dr. Percival and Rev. J. C. Speer. Both of these speakers were in their best form, and gave a lot of interesting information in reference to the work of the bible society and bible history. Good music was furnished by the choir of the Presbyterian church. The meeting adjourned after taking up the collection.

Review.

Last Sabbath was Review Sunday at the Methodist Sabbath School. These occasions once a quarter are field days for the teachers in this school, any teacher having the opportunity of calling the attention of the scholars to the topic of any lesson studied during the quarter. Short addresses were delivered by Mr. J. A. E. Switzer, the Bible-class teacher, on lessons from the character of Esther; Mr. A. J. Hume, on the "Reading of the Law;" Mr. Wm. Glass, on the "Observance of the Sabbath."
