Kinghorn.
A very sad accident happened in Low-
ell Tannery on Thursday last, April 6th.
A workman, Charles Gould, was busy
slushing; the other workmen were en-
gaged at their respective employment,
of course did not notice how Gould's
work was progressing, or pay any atten-
tion to him whatever. The foreman of
the tannery happened to pass the wheel
noticed that the man was not getting
along with the work and was not to be
found. He asked one of the workmen
near if he knew where Charles was, and
received the reply that he did not know,
but supposed he had gone out, as he had
not seen him for some little time. No
anxiety was felt until at the expiration
of half an hour, Gould not yet making
his appearance, some of the men began

to express fears that all was not right.
They commenced a search, which was
fruitless, until some one suggested that
they search the bait-wheel, which stood
near the slush-wheel and below the floor.
A yard hook was immediately got, and in
a short time poor Gould was dragged out
dead. How he got into the wheel is and
will always remain a mystery. He was
found at 4 o'clock. Dr. Norman was
summoned, and was on the scene in a
few minutes. He said that death result-
ed from drowning, and that the man had
been dead for some time. All work at
the tannery was immediately stopped,
and was not resumed until after the
funeral.
Gould was between 34 and 35 years of
age, and leaves a wife and five small
children. He had been in the tannery
only a month. His remains were follow-
ed to All Saints Church burying ground
on Friday by a number of sorrowing
relatives and fellow workmen. Rev.
Francis Heathcote delivered a very touch-
ing address in the church and then per-
formed the sacred rites at the grave.
The family have the sincere sympathy
of this community in their sad and un-
expected bereavement.

The members comprising the Local
Board of Health for the Village of Rich-
mond Hill met in the Village Clerk's
office on Tuesday evening, April 11th, at
8 o'clock.

Present: Messrs. W. H. Pugsley
(Reeve), M. Teeffy (Clerk), Dr. W. J.
Wilson, Henry Miller, Matthew McNair
—together with James Brownlee as San-
itary Inspector—who made and subscrib-
ed their respective declarations of office.

It was moved, seconded and carried
that Mr. Pugsley be the chairman of this
Board for the ensuing year.

The clerk read the minutes of the last
meeting (25th June, 1892), which were
approved.

The Clerk read a printed circular from
the Secretary of the Provincial Board
dated 5th of January, 1893.

Mr. Henry Miller complained of the
state of the premises occupied by Henry
F. Hopper, a butcher.
Moved by Mr. Miller, seconded by
Mr. McNair, that the Sanitary Inspector
be and is hereby instructed to enforce
the Statutory By-Law of the Public
Health Act in regard to Henry F. Hopper
and W. James Gould.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McNair, seconded by
Dr. Wilson, that the Clerk be and is
hereby instructed to notify Isaac Walder
and inform him that he shall not slaughter
animals or in any manner contravene
Section 63 of "The Public Health Act,"
or otherwise create a nuisance on the
premises now occupied by him contrary
to any of the provisions of the said Act,
Chapter 205 Revised Statutes of Ontario,
relating to piggeries.—Carried.

Mr. Miller moved, seconded by Dr.
Wilson, that the Clerk be and is hereby
instructed to procure printed notices to
the public requesting householders and
others to clean their wells, yards and
premises forthwith, in order as far as
possible to prevent disease.—Carried.
