Drowned at Kinghorn.

A fatal accident occurred at the Lowell tannery, a mile west of King City, on Thursday last. During the afternoon it was found that one of the men employed in the lower part of the establishment was missing. Search was at once made and after a time the lost man, Charles Gould, was found drowned in one of the vats. Dr. Hillary, as Coroner, was at once communicated with, but he decided that it was not necessary to hold an inquest, as by what he could learn he thought it must have been purely accidental. Some of the unfortunate man's fellow workmen think that he must have taken a fit and fallen in. Mr. E. J. Davis, M. P., proprietor of the tannery, who was in Toronto attending the meeting of the Ontario Legislature, was telephoned for, and was distressed to learn of the stocking accident. Deceased had only been at the tannery about a month, and the time for which he had engaged would have been up in a few days.

Store Broken Into.

A bold act was committed in the village on Sunday evening. When the family of Mr. A. G. Elliott returned from church they found that an entrance had been made into their store—Falconbridge's old stand. The party effected an entrance into the residence by breaking a pane of glass in a window and then raising the sash. When the intruders found that they still were unable to get into the store, they burst the lock, which must have taken considerable force. Although there were silk handkerchiefs and other costly goods that could have easily been carried away without difficulty, nothing was missed except a quantity of candies. As nothing of particular value appears to have been taken it is thought the bold act was the work of boys. If this be the case it is to be hoped that such a mean and dangerous trick will not be repeated as it is sure to lead to serious consequences in the end.

The Canadian Order of Foresters is a Fraternal Benevolent Society, incorporated in 1879 and registered under the Insurance Corporations Act 1892, of Ontario. The objects of the Society are to furnish its members with Sick and Funeral Benefits and an Insurance of one or two thousand dollars. The payments for these benefits range from about one dollar to one dollar and fifty cents per month, according to the age of the member and the amount of the insurance carried. The membership is composed of men only, and when admitted they must be between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. The present number of members is over 16,000, and the Society has a cash surplus on hand for the payment of the Insurance of over \$215,000, \$50,000 of which is in Dominion of Canada Bonds, and the balance is invested in the best monetary institutions of the Dominion. In addition to this, the local Courts have about half a million of dollars in their treasuries for the payment of the Sick and Funeral Benefits. The High Secretary of the Order is Mr. Thomas White of Brantford, and it is expected that a Court of this popular and purely Canadian Society will shortly be organized here.—(Adv.)
