**Precautions against Cholera**

The principal personal precautions are  
as follows:

As the normal acid juices of the stomach  
can destroy the infection if it should be  
introduced, nothing should be done to  
impair or enfeeble the digestive powers.

Hence the importance of regular habits  
of life—of careful preservation of good  
digestive powers. Particularly,

1. Avoid drinking large quantities of  
water especially between meals, because  
between meals a neutral reaction of the  
gastric juice exists, and the protective  
effect of acid gastric juice against the  
bacillus is lost.

2. Use a plain nutritious diet. All  
food should be eaten freshly cooked. All  
uncooked food, such as raw fruit, salads,  
etc., should be avoided.

3. Take meals at regular hours.

4. Be cheerful. Avoid great fatigue,  
excitement, dampness or chill air.

5. Wash the hands before eating,  
using soap freely; use disinfectants if  
hands are likely to be infected. Avoid  
eating in a room where a cholera patient  
is or has recently been.

6. Do not use water or milk which  
has not been boiled. (This applies also  
to water used for washing dishes, kitchen  
utensils, etc.)

7. Indulge in no excesses of eating or  
drinking, especially of alcoholic stimu-  
lants. Avoid iced drinks.

8. Pay great attention to the state of  
the bowels. If attacked with diarrhoea  
get medical advice without delay. When  
cholera prevails diarrhoea is often the  
first symptom of the disease.

9. Pay great attention to personal  
cleanliness, and also to that of your  
clothing.

On motion of J. E. Clubine, seconded  
by R. E. Law, the thanks of the Direc-  
tors were tendered to Rev. J. C. Speer  
for his able assistance as chairman at the  
Sara Lord Bailey concert, and to Mr. J.  
T. Saigeon as auctioneer for sale of maga-  
zines at the close of said entertainment.

The business of the meeting being  
finished, the Annual Meeting was then  
held. The above named directors were  
present, also Mr. N. Robertson.

The minutes of last Annual Meeting  
were read. On motion of Mr. Law,  
seconded by Mr. McConaghy, the num-  
ber of volumes in the library as given in  
minutes, was changed from 1750 to 1550,  
it being intimated by the librarian that  
the latter number was correct. After  
the figure was corrected the minutes were  
adopted.

Reports were then presented from the  
Secretary, the Treasurer and the Librar-  
ian.

The Secretary's report showed that  
there was a membership of 112, that  
\$53 00 had been collected for tickets  
during the year, and that six members  
had not paid their fee for library tickets.  
Also that \$235 57 had been received by  
the Secretary and paid over to the Treas-  
urer.

The Treasurer's statement showed the  
receipts to be \$254 87, payments \$245 74,  
leaving a balance in his hands of \$9 13.

The Librarian's report showed that 85  
volumes of books had been added during  
the past year, and 40 volumes of bound  
magazines, making in all 125 volumes  
added; 13 volumes lost and worn out,  
leaving an increase of 112 volumes.  
1594 volumes were taken out during the  
year, an increase of 136 over last year.

regular duties of his new pastorate there.

He will get size, style, substance, and speed, and when he does not sire a trotter he will sire a big, handsome, stylish roadster that is always in demand, but being one of a line of trotters, he will not fail to sire extreme speed when mated with good mares. The day of pedigreed trotters that cannot trot is past, and poor individuals with a pedigree on paper are no longer wanted.

OLIVER W. is a race horse and a campaigner. He has won heaps of money after his stud season was over, and yet withal he stands to-day without a pimple or a puff. He has a constitution of iron and a nerve of steel.
