BEWARE OF FAKES.

Under the heading of "Fake Prize Competitions," The Recorder of last week expressed its gratification at what it termed the "conversion" of THE LIBERAL, in our refusing to insert an advertisement from the Parisian Glove Company, Toronto, the previous week. Our refusal of the advertisement was based on the fact that the alleged company did not give its number, nor yet the street on which its office was situated. We must admit that advertisements have appeared in our paper on different occasions which looked very much like a fake, but for this the newspaper man can scarcely be held responsible. As a rule the advertiser buys so much space, and he is allowed to select his own matter, providing it is not of a lowering or immoral nature. In many cases it is absolutely impossible for a publisher to tell whether a firm is anywhere near the truth when it is advertising its goods. If a company gives its address, the people who deal with that company should be prepared to accept the responsibility if they do not get value for the money they invest. At the same time we caution our readers to beware of those people who promise to give you a large amount by investing a small sum.

MARTE'S BILL REJECTED.

The Marter Bill, which proposed that the sale of liquor, in quantities of less than four gallons, should be prohibited, was rejected in the Ontario Legislature on Tuesday night. The vote stood 33 for, and 54 against the measure. Mr. Mowat and his followers took the view that there were doubts about the power of the Provincial Legislature passing such a bill, and that in case that it were proven to be *ultra vires*, temperance would be retarded instead of forwarded. Mr. Meredith supported the bill, and suggested that it be passed, and then tried in the courts as to its constitutionality. It is to be regretted that such an important matter as temperance should be discussed in a party spirit, as it certainly was during the debate. We firmly believe, however, that Mr. Mowat went far enough when he told the House he would pass a prohibition law if the courts decided he had the power. Mr. Meredith made an able speech from a party standpoint, though it was evident he was more inclined to throw discredit on his opponents, than to discuss the bill on its merits. By an amendment moved by Mr. Ross, a plebiscite, to test the feeling of the Ontario voters, will be taken at the Municipal elections in January.
