



The president was nominated, but explained that he would not be able to attend, as the county council would be in session at the same time and he would have to be in attendance there. Mr. J. K. Leslie being a delegate under the arrangements of the convention the following five were elected :- G. B. Smith, M. PP.; J. H. Mackenzie, St. Paul's ward; G. R. Vanzant, Markham; John Rich ardson, York; John C. Clark, Scarboro'. And the following alternates:-John Gibb, T. S. Lobb, Thomas Finucan, Jas. Long, alternates for Mr. Smith; Albert Britnell, J. H. McLaren, R. P. Dixon, Alexander Gibb, for Mr. Mackenzie; W. Noble, Anthony Forster, Jas. Eckardt, John Pike, for Mr. Vanzant; Jas. Flynn. G. W. Omerod, Wm. McGinn, J. L. It was decided to elect only these twenty alternates, but the president was authorized to appoint as many more as he may see fit. This concluded the business and brief speeches were made by Messrs. Smith, Leslie, Richardson, Clark and Gregory.

Mr. Smith referred to the necessity for a convention so that the policy with which the Liberals go into the next election may have the endorsation of the whole party from the Atlantic to the Pacific. At the last elections the country was told that the Liberal policy had been designed by a few leaders from sinister motives, and that it had not the hearty support of the great body of Liberals. The annexation cry had had some effect at that time, but no one would dare to say that a policy adopted in public assembly by the great Liberal party was calculated to destroy the institutions of this country. He believed that the policy upon which the Liberals had fought the last elections would be endorsed by the convention as in the best interests of Canada, and he believed they would have won in 1891 if a convention had been held then. As it was they had obtained the support of a large majority of the electors, but with the gerrymander and the machinery for making votes in their hands, besides all the influences the government could exercise, the Liberals would have to get two thirds or threefourths of the honest electors before they could get into power. > THE TREATY-MAKING POWER. Mr. W. D. Gregory was the last speaker. Dealing with Mr. J K. Leslie's advocacy of free trade with Great Britain and reciprocity with the United States, Mr. Gregory pointed out that the requirements of the revenue rendered free trade with Great Britain out of the question. Seventy-five per cent. of Canada's expenditure was uncontrollable and could not be reduced, while the saving that could be effected out of the remaining 25 per cent, would fall far short of equalling the reduction of \$12,000,000 in customs receipts, which would follow free trade with Britain. Then, again, free trade with Great Britain and unrestricted reciprocity with the United States, he said, were impracticable. Every one knew that they could not have unrestricted reciprocity with the United States and at the same time admit free from Great Britain articles upon which the United States imposed duties. As between free trade with Great Britain and free trade with the United States, he considered the latter more advantageous than the former. If free trade with the United States were secured the British market would still be open. Canada was suffering now not so much from the duties imposed by her own government as by the duties imposed by the United States. Therefore, the object should be to secure if possible the removal of these duties. As for himself, he said, he firmly believed in the reunion of the English-speaking race upou 1 inch high, and is a perfect model of this continent. Mr. Gregory expressed the hope that the delegates to the Ottawa convention would endeavor to procure an expression in favor of certain changes in the Canadian constitution. Now, he said, Canada cannot alter a line of it, nor could by inheritance, and a sire of trotters. she make a treaty, or conduct any international negotiations.
