Learning from a hand-bill that this amiable Briton had assisted at 500 executions, and had hanged 193 people with his own hands, the writer took the place of the timid yet curious citizen and paid the penitent finisher of the law a visit on the first evening.

"The position in which I appear before you requires a little explanation, because it is the first time an executioner ever appeared before the public to advocate the abolition of capital punishment." In the course of a somewhat discursive and conversational lecture he ran over in detail many of the scenes in connection with recent executions in various parts of the United Kingdom, scenes in the condemned cell, bringing out strongly the fact that a man who had once suffered the horrors of penal servitude never fails to express himself as being thankful he was sentenced to be hanged rather than to be sent back to the hulks.

Few criminals, he avers, would prefer a second term of penal servitude if they had the choice of the gallows.
