Division Court.

Division Court was held here on Fri-
day, His Honor, Judge Morgan, presid-
ing. There was quite a number of cases
on the docket, but some of them, which
were thought would be the most interest-
ing to spectators, did not come up for
hearing.

Hunter v Kerswill was postponed
until next court, as the plaintiff asked to
enlarge the case.

The second case was Hickson v. Brill-
inger. This was for wood, \$36. De-
fendant claimed that the measurement
was short. The full amount was allowed,
less \$10 as an offset put in by defendant.

Vokes v. Harvey—Account of \$13 for
nails, &c., which Vokes sold Harvey for
the latter's son and son-in-law. Defen-
dant said he had been told by his son and
son-in-law that the goods had been paid
for. He also claimed the protection of
the Statute of Limitation and the case
was dismissed.

Jenkins v. Ritter—\$14 74. One Boynton
who had been in the employ of Rit-
ter gave the latter an order to pay
Jenkins the above amount out of his
wages. Ritter kept the order but from
time to time paid Boynton wages until
nothing was left for Jenkins. His Honor
held that the defendant had no right to
have paid Boynton any more wages after
having accepted the order, and gave
judgment for the amount with costs of
court.

Wilson v. McDonald was allowed to
stand until next court to enable the de-
fendant to get a witness from Manitoba.

Oliver v. Lahmer—The defendant was
ordered to pay \$5 a month until account
is paid.

Several other minor cases were dis-
posed of, and others adjourned.
The next meeting of the court will be
on Friday, October 6th, 1893.
