EAST YORK'S NOMINEE.

The Reformers of East York in selecting Mr. John Richardson, reeve of Scarborough, as their standard bearer for the next general election for the Local House, in the place of Mr. G. B. Smith, who will retire owing to ill-health, have made a wise choice. No man should know the wants of a rural constituency like East York better than a practical farmer. Mr. Richardson is not only an experienced farmer, but he has been well schooled in municipal matters, both in the township and county. Few men have had a better training in municipal affairs than he. He has been a member of the Scarborough township council during eighteen consecutive years, and for the past fifteen years he has been one of the most active and prominent members of the Council of the County of York. He has filled the Warden's chair with much acceptance, and for several years past he has occupied a place on most of the important committees appointed by the council. In fact he has been so often a member of the Legislative Committee that the work of the Legislature should be quite familiar to him. Everything considered Mr. Richardson is a most desirable candidate, and one whom the Liberals should have little difficulty in carrying to victory.

PROPOSED SHIP CANAL.

There is quite an interest taken just now over the proposal to build the Hurontario ship canal. The scheme was unfolded a few days ago to the city council by Mr. E. A. Macdonald, and it is understood that the petitioners have received considerable encouragement from many of the members. It is claimed by the promoters that in a trip eastward from Chicago about 900 miles would be saved by going through the proposed canal instead of the course now taken by the St. Clair river, Detroit river, Welland canal, &c. Toronto people are not asked to subscribe any capital, but they are to guarantee the company freedom from taxation as well as other privileges. The city must also give a guarantee that they will purchase water from the company at so much per thousand gallons. The scheme looks visionary on the face of it, but it is worth investigating, as if the promises given could be carried out, Toronto would derive inestimable benefits.

A friend, meeting Mr. H. Quetton St. George at the Laurier demonstration on Tuesday, remarked to him "Is it true that you have changed your politics and left the Conservative Party?" "No," answered the genial old gentleman, "I have not changed my politics, and I only left the Conservative party when they changed their policy in favor of Protection. I have always been a free trader, and voted for the National Policy in 1878, because my then leader, the late Sir John Macdonald, assured me that Protection was to be temporary, and was only a means to an end. I am satisfied that Protection is ruination to the farmers, and therefore I cannot support it."
