"Go in for the abolition of Separate Schools, Mr. Meredith, and the Province is yours."

The above paragraph concludes an editorial in the Evening News of Tuesday, in which the leader of the Opposition is urged to take strong ground against the Separate Schools in Ontario. The News in offering this advice says that Mr. Meredith must either mount the Protestant horse and ride it more fearlessly than ever before, or he must withdraw the language used towards the Catholic body in his campaign of three years ago. Honesty is the best policy, and it certainly is not honest to try to hoist a government on a question which is beyond its power.
