GOOD (?) ADVICE.

"Go in for the abolition of Separate Schools, Mr. Meredith, and the Province is yours."

The above paragraph concludes an editorial in the Evening News of Tuesday, in which the leader of the Opposition is urged to take strong ground against the Separate Schools in Ontario. The News in offering this advice says that Mr. Meredith must either mount the Protestant horse and ride it more fearlessly than ever before, or he must withdraw the language used towards the Catholic body in his campaign of three years ago. It suggests the former course as the best policy, for although it says that by apologizing he would draw a few Catholics to his side, he would nevertheless drive many Protestants from him and end his public career in disgrace. The News shows its unwisdom in proffering any such advice. That journal should know that the Ontario Legislature has no power to abolish Separate Schools. If a constitutional amendment relative to the Separate Schools is ever made it must be by the British Parliament, and it would be more in order for the petition to emanate from the Dominion House of Commons. Mr. Meredith endeavored on a former occasion to climb into power over the backs of the government benches by similar tactics, but as he failed before he would most assuredly fail again. Honesty is the best policy, and it certainly is not honest to try to hoist a government on a question which is beyond its power.

Now is the time to get a membership ticket for the Mechanics' Institute. The season commenced on the first of October, and people purchasing at once get the use of the excellent library for twelve months for 50 cents. The lady ticket-sellers have started on their yearly rounds, and it is to be hoped that every family in the village will procure a ticket. The library committee have been authorized to purchase new books in a few weeks to the extent of \$125, therefore we say to our citizens, don't be asked twice to become a member.

The total debenture debt is given at \$28,133.33, but The Banner endeavors to console the citizens by stating that "On the first of January \$2,459.10 of this amount will be paid, leaving the debt at \$25,674.23."
