The contests are as follows: First day—Two year old single horse in harness; three year old single horse in harness; pony, 13 hands or under, in harness; best gentleman's road horse in harness to buggy of not less than 250 lbs.; bicycle race, 5 miles on the track. Second day—Single horse in harness open to all; single horse in harness that never beat 3 minutes; farmers' premium, single horse in harness.

 H. Gillis vs. J. Atkinson—Claim for wages \$60.75. Judgment for plaintiff for \$54.  
 D. Eade vs. W. Palmer—Claim of \$3.23 for cigars when the latter kept hotel. Judgment for plaintiff for \$2.50, but if Palmer can prove that he sold his business in November, 1885, judgment will be given defendant with costs.

J. Wilson vs. J. Macdonald—Disputed account. Adjourned to next court.

Hunter vs. Kerswill was settled by the parties concerned out of court.

The next sitting of the court will be held on Saturday, the 30th of November.
