Markham Council.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Markham met at the Town Hall, Unionville, on Saturday, Oct. 21st, at 11 a. m.

Members all present.
Reeve in the chair.
Communications were read from Jos. Munday, re. allowance for sidewalks; from E. Gallanough, re. Statute Labor.

A resolution was read from S. Ritter and others for grant to gravel sidewalk between lots 10 and 11, Con. 2.

Scott—Reesor—moved that the treasurer pay John Miller \$36 68, being two-thirds value of three Southdown lambs killed and two injured by dogs, owners of which are unknown as testified on oath.—Carried.

Scott—Lawrie—moved that the mover be a commissioner to repair bridge on sidewalk between lots 25 and 26, Con. 4, and to clean out ditch on 5th Con., lot 20, on condition that party interested pay half the expenses.—Carried.

Lawrie—Scott—moved that Mr. Reesor be a commissioner to repair hills at Wilcott's Creek, townline between Markham and Scarborough, culvert on Con. 9, lot 6, and bridge on townline Markham and Scarborough, near Mr. Freeman's property; amount payable on his order when work is completed.—Carried.

Lawrie—Reesor—moved that the treasurer pay John Clark the following account, filling gravel \$2.00, furnishing lumber, \$1.50, cutting thistles, \$1.00, plaining road, 50 cents, total \$5.00.—Carried.

Scott—Quantz—moved that the treasurer pay R. Goodyear, \$1.50 for repairing bridge on 3rd Con., as certified by T. F. Boynton, R. O.; also Corson & Son for printing 1600 collectors receipts \$6.50, Advertising Judges Court of Revision, \$6.40—\$12.90.—Carried.

Reesor—Lawrie—moved that treasurer refund Wm. Jones \$1.00, he being wrongfully assessed for a dog.—Carried.

Scott—Reesor—moved that in answer to the petition of S. Ritter and others Mr. Quantz be appointed a commissioner to expend, if demanded advisable a sum not to exceed \$50, of the appropriation made to Brown's Corners' sidewalk; amount required payable on order of commissioner when work is completed.—Carried.

Quantz—Reesor—moved that the treasurer pay the following gravel accounts as certified by the road overseers.

Lawrie—Quantz—moved that the treasurer refund Mr. Reesor 78 cents expressage, &c., in connection with bridge at Box Grove.—Carried.

Quantz—Lawrie—moved that the sum of \$4 per month be granted to Mrs. Johnson during the pleasure of this council, and that the treasurer is hereby authorized to pay the same.—Carried.

Reesor—Lawrie—moved that the mover be a commissioner to widen creek north of bridge at Box Grove; sum required payable on his order when work is completed.—Carried.

Scott—Quantz—moved that Mr. Lawrie be and is hereby authorized to effect a settlement with P. Davies for damages alleged to have been sustained through horse taking fright at township pile driver.—Carried.

Lawrie—Scott—moved that when this council adjourns it stands adjourned until Saturday, Nov. 25th.—Carried.

Quantz—Lawrie—moved that the mover be a commissioner to open ditch opposite lots 14 and 15, Con. 2, providing the owners of said lots bear half of expense; amount payable on his order when work is completed.—Carried.

Council then adjourned.

The city clerk has registered 72 births, 34 marriages and 55 deaths this week.

The street commissioner has commenced the widening of Broadway Ave. between Gerrard and Queen streets.

Cecil, the beloved son of Rev. W. A. Hunter, of 20 Cecil street, died on Friday last, aged three years.

From far away Nova Scotia, three little girls residing in Tatamagoushe, had a bazaar and made \$3, which they sent to our Hospital for Sick Children. The gift is most acceptable, and has been sent to the treasurer of the hospital.

At the Deer Park Presbyterian church, Wednesday, a very pretty wedding took place. The contracting parties were Miss Skinner and Mr. Tretheway, of Chicago. Rev. Mr. Freeman, assisted by Rev. Mr. White, performed the ceremony. Flowers in profusion were grouped in all parts of the church, which gave additional brilliancy to the scene.

The city council has voted \$1,000 to entertain Lord Aberdeen and party on their arrival in the city. This craze for entertaining distinguished visitors at the expense of the already overburdened taxpayers is one of the many faults of our council. Lord Aberdeen could be welcomed to our city in a suitable manner without this expenditure. Governor-Generals are becoming costly ornaments to Canada, without in any way being useful.

The first annual "At Home" of the East End Crèche was held in the Creche building, 161 Sackville street, on Monday evening. This institution is a day nursery for small children whose mothers, many of whom being the sole support of their families, are compelled to work out during the day, and have no one with whom to leave their little ones.

The Mission at the North End Church Hall, Yonge street, is in a very flourishing condition. The attendance at the Sunday evening service now numbers about 100, and the week night meetings are also well attended. Rev. Geo. M. Wrong, University College, is in charge and conducts the Sunday evening meetings. Mr. Wrong is most earnestly and zealously assisted by a number of lady workers, to whom too much praise cannot be given for the good work they are doing at the Mission Hall and also as district visitors.
