THE TEMPERANCE QUESTION.

The temperance plebiscite is coming to the front as the interesting topic for discussion. Various churches and temperance societies are preparing for a heavy vote in favor of the measure, and municipal clerks are looking up the law relative to the taking of the vote on the first of January. The Dominion Government has decided to submit the same questions to the Supreme Court that the Ontario Legislature has to the Court of Appeal. Therefore the temperance question may be looked upon as an issue from this time forward. Before many months it should be known whether the provinces have the power to prohibit the manufacture, importation or sale of spirituous liquors.

The Court will be asked to pronounce upon the following questions: 1. Has the provincial legislature jurisdiction to prohibit the sale, within the province, of spirituous, fermented, or other intoxicating liquors? 2. Or has the legislature such jurisdiction regarding such portions of the province as to which the Canada Temperance Act is not in operation? 3. Has a provincial legislature jurisdiction to prohibit the manufacture of such liquors within the province? 4. Has a provincial legislature jurisdiction to prohibit the importation of such liquors into the province? 5. If a provincial legislature has no such powers as above, has it the power to prohibit the sale by retail? The sixth and seventh questions ask for certain definitions of the jurisdiction of the provinces and also if Ontario had power to pass the Local Option Act.

The True Witness of last week published a letter signed by a large number of ministers of Protestant churches in Columbus, Ohio, in which they denounce the A. P. A. (American Protective Association), and refute the slanders that are being circulated regarding Roman Catholics. These ministers declare their opposition to the Catholic church and her teachings, but they refuse to be a party to what they know to be false and slanderous. Those Christian ministers say over their own signatures that an alleged letter of the Pope, which calls upon the Catholics to rise and exterminate the Protestants, has been proven to be a forgery. They also show that the statements made that the schools and offices are over-run by Catholics are not based upon facts. The letter which is signed by eighteen ministers of Presbyterian, Congregational, Baptist and other churches, reflects much credit on the writers, and should be a good example for all who believe in toleration.

Principal Grant, of Queen's College, Kingston, has written two lengthy letters to the Toronto Globe and promises a third to that journal. The scholarly writer attacks the policy of the Dominion Government, refers to the losses of the Intercolonial Railway, the deficit in the Post Office Department, and says there are too many ministers in the cabinet. He strikes the National Policy hard, but is not in sympathy with the Dominion opposition. From the drift of his arguments the Principal may be placed among the politicians who favor Imperial Federation.

Ontario Prohibition Plebiscite.

A very representative gathering of temperance workers from all parts of the County of York took place in the Mechanics' Hall, Aurora, on Tuesday of last week. J. S. Green, Newmarket, chairman and Rev. G. Washington, Queensville, secretary. On the recommendation of the Resolution Committee it was decided to ask the ministers of the county to call the attention of their congregations at their earliest convenience to the necessity of voting in favor of prohibition on the approaching plebiscite, and also to solicit the co-operation of the local press. The Literature Committee reported in favor of obtaining statistics bearing upon the question and causing the same to be distributed as widely as funds will allow. Committee on Campaign Work appointed conveners for the municipalities. Committee on Finance estimates the expenses of the campaign at \$365 and apportioned this sum to be raised among the various municipalities. A Mass-meeting was held at the same place in the evening, and was very enthusiastic.

Some of the city contractors are employing boys at 50 cents a day to lay paving brick. This will be stopped as there are too many idle men and the contractors have pretty good profit with the men without employing boys.

A National Council of Women for Canada has been organized here with Lady Aderdeen as President. The object of this association is to federate all the other existing societies, so that each may know what the other is doing, in this way preventing an overlapping of philanthropic endeavor.
