**EDITORIAL NOTES.**

The voting in two constituencies on the 2nd of next month will give some idea as to the feeling of the people in Ontario politics. On that day the electors of East Lambton and North Bruce will be called upon to fill the vacancies in these ridings.

Rev. Dr. Wild and Col. O'Brien were on the platform and gave addresses along with Mr. Dalton McCarthy at the Stratford meeting on Friday. Those politicians evidently believe in killing two birds with one stone as at the close of the meeting a candidate was selected to contest North Perth in the McCarthy interest.

A good deal of comment has been caused in political circles by the fact that the Winnipeg Free Press, in which President VanHorne, of the Canadian Pacific railway, is a shareholder, is supporting Mr. Martin, the Liberal candidate in Winnipeg. Mr. VanHorne in an interview on Friday, said that the Canadian Pacific is absolutely out of politics, and as for himself, while he is a stockholder in the Free Press, he has no voice in its policy.

Mr. Ellis, the editor of the St. John's Globe, who has just been released from jail after serving a term for saying hard things against Judge Tuck, seems to be the lion of the hour. He was welcomed back to his home by a monster demonstration in which prominent citizens of all shades of politics participated. If public opinion is a safe criterion to be guided by Mr. Ellis is a much-abused man. It is safe to say that nine journalists out of ten in this province have condemned his imprisonment. It is only fair to remember, however, that the law is very strict in shielding judges from imputations, and Mr. Ellis showed no inclination to withdraw anything that he said.

The Empire of yesterday says that notwithstanding that "sundry agitators and enemies of the Government argue that there is widespread dissatisfaction against the tariff, it does not appear that there is much basis of truth for their assertions." The Empire goes on to say that Hon. Messrs. Wallace and Wood, after making a tour of the provinces and after holding conferences with representative men from both sides of politics, are able to report that the principle of the National Policy is sound. If the farmers are satisfied with their trade relations with other countries by all means let them work along the same lines as they have been doing since 1878.

At the McCarthy demonstration at Tara on Thursday last the Women's Christian Temperance Union sent up to the leader of the Third Party a series of questions bearing upon the prohibition question, respectfully requesting a reply. Referring to the questions Mr. McCarthy afterwards said:

"On the prohibition question I have to say that I do not believe in the effectiveness of a prohibition law. I would not be understood as not realizing the enormous evil of intemperance, but as to the remedy good men differed, and I do not think a law could be enforced which would deprive temperate men of the right to use their own judgment as to what they should eat and drink. There was no reason why the temperance people should not cherish every hope of the final triumph of their cause. I think the proper course is now being adopted in instilling temperance principles into the

minds of the young, who will grow up a people favorable to all reasonable practical restrictions. At present the state of public opinion is such that a carnival of lawlessness and a carnival of licentiousness will follow a rigid restriction. My opinion is entirely my own, and I do not bind my friends in any sense. I would give women the franchise in school, municipal, and local Legislative elections. The reason why I am not prepared to say that I would admit women to the Dominion suffrage, is that the ultimate arbiter in the wider affairs of the country is the strong arm of the soldier."

The Tribune, of Toronto Junction, gives an account of an Orangemen's supper held in that town a few evenings previous. If our cotem. is correct the social supper was converted into a Conservative meeting. "We are informed on reliable authority," says the Tribune, "that on the occasion referred to Mr. George Syme spoke of the good effect of the Order on the Conservative cause in West York and joyfully predicted that the increase of the Orange Lodges would ensure the defeat of Dr. Gilmour in the next election." As the Orange Organization professes to be non-partizan some of the members must have forgotten themselves on the above occasion as it is easy to sow discord at such a meeting. The Tribune closes its editorial with the following paragraph:

"If, however, the suspicion that Orangeism has become a party machine—an adjunct of Conservatism—is well-founded, Mr. Syme's utterance does him credit as a man of candor. If a gathering of Orangemen means a Conservative caucus, it is only fair to let the Liberals know it, and Mr. Syme deserves credit for making known what, for obvious reasons, some of his brethren strive to conceal."
