The case against James Robinson, of sale. Markham Village, charged with misappropriation of trust funds to the amount of \$1,200 was before the Assize Court in Toronto last week. Peck, of Cortland, N. Y., swore that Robinson had excused himself for not giving up the \$1,200 by saying that he had met with business misfortunes. Robinson's own testimony was that the money had been given him to satisfy his own claims against the estate, and that he had never admitted toat the money given him was for any other purpose. He produced witnesses to prove the indebtedness of the estate to him. The jury after two hours' deliberation brought in a verdict of "not guilty."
