Wallpapers did not come into common use in Europe till the eighteenth century, but stamped papers for the purpose appear to have been made in Spain and Holland about 1555. The art of paper hanging in imitation of the old velvet flock was new when William came to England. It was on the walls of the drawing-room at Kensington Palace that these new hangings were first seen in Britain. They took the fancy of the fashionables of the day, and their cheapness being an additional recommendation, they speedily came into general use.

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
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
