"EQUAL RIGHTS."

The Mail of Friday last published from an official document just issued by the supreme body, the objects and declaration of principles of the Canadian P. P. A. (Protestant Protective Association). Principle No. 6 reads as follows: "It is in our opinion unwise and unsafe to appoint or elect to civic, political or military office in this country men who owe supreme allegiance to any foreign king, potentate or ecclesiastical power, and who are sworn to obey such power."

Further on a series of questions are given which must be answered satisfactorily by candidates aspiring to public positions before they can receive the support of members of the society. The first question asked a candidate for the Legislative Assembly is "Are you prepared to do all you can to abolish Separate Schools?"

Question No. 8 applies to aspirants for the position of school trustees. It is as follows: "If elected will you promise that no Roman Catholic will be employed as teacher by the School Board?"

By the above it is evident that the P. P. A. would not allow Roman Catholics to have Separate Schools in this province; neither would they permit Roman Catholics to teach in the Public Schools.

The Mail says the Association arose out of the Equal Rights agitation. This is Equal Rights with a vengeance.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Section 112, chap. 42, Consolidated Municipal Act, 55 Vict., provides that "When the last Monday in December happens to fall on Christmas day, the nomination of candidates for the offices of mayor and aldermen in cities, and of mayor, reeve, deputy-reeves and councillors in other municipalities, shall take place on the preceding Friday, at the time and place, and in the manner prescribed by law." Nomination, therefore, this year will be held on Friday, the 22nd of December.

The sentence of Hon. Thomas McGreevy, ex-M. P., and Nicholas K. Connolly, contractor, is imprisonment for one year without labor. The indictment was for conspiracy, and the judge in passing sentence referred to the painful nature of his duty. His Honor's condemnation was sympathetic, though severe, intimating that the defendants' sins were partly the faults of many other people. Messrs. McGreevy and Connolly though in prison are no worse than many others who were accused at the same time.

The Plebiscite Campaign Executive of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, has sent out a circular letter giving information to women voters in reference to the plebiscite vote to be taken on the first of January next, and urging upon the ladies the necessity of working in order to roll up a large majority in favor of prohibition. As the latter shows, the result of this vote will convey to the Legislature information not only as to the attitude of a section of the women of Ontario towards the liquor traffic, but also the extent to which women in possession of the franchise are willing to exercise that right.

The Ways and Means Committee of the United States Congress has announced the proposed customs tariff. If the tariff goes into force as proposed hundreds of articles

and commodities will be admitted into that country free of duty. Canadians generally will look upon the reductions with favor as many of the changes will be of much importance to producers in this country. Among articles to be admitted free are eggs, wool, iron, coal and fruits. Barley will be lowered from 30 cents a bushel to 20 per cent., which, at the present price, will leave a duty of about 12 cents a bushel. No doubt the action of the Democrats will stimulate the Canadian government to begin to cut away the "mouldering branches" from our own precious (?) National Policy.

The Globe, as usual, is leading its city cotems in enterprize by sending two of its correspondents to Iowa and Kansas to inquire into the working of the prohibitory liquor law in those states. Mr. J. E. Atkinson, one of the gentlemen who have been sent to make the investigation, is a well-known prohibitionist as well as a total abstainer. The other, Mr. J. A. Ewan, is opposed to prohibition on principle, and does not believe that it can be properly enforced. The Globe says that each of the writers is asked to give an unprejudiced account of his observations, that the readers of that paper may form an idea as to whether prohibition could be successfully enforced in this country.

The first of the letters appeared on Monday, and others will follow during the next five weeks before the plebiscite is taken. Both sides should be carefully read, and read without prejudice, as the main question in the campaign should be, can prohibition, if carried, be successfully enforced? The first two letters were little more than an introduction. They showed, however, that the law in Iowa was not very well enforced. The Legislature of the state it seems has done everything to make the prosecutions easy, but as the municipalities are left to enforce the law it is often badly done. Mr. Atkinson gave it as his opinion that a prohibitory law could be much more easily enforced in Ontario.

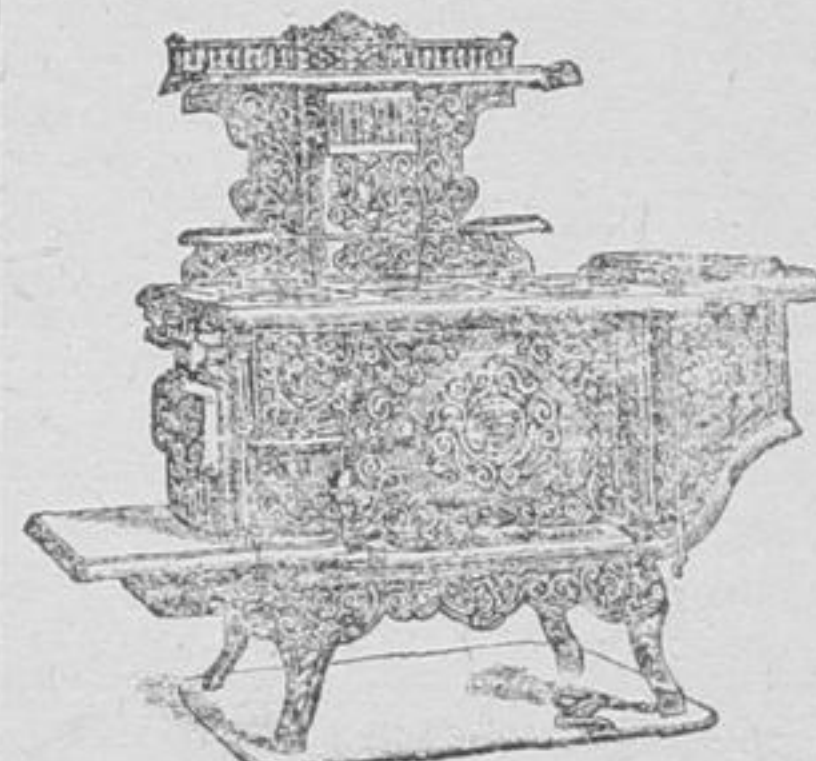
