### SIMILAR POLICIES.

The Empire of Monday published the platform, as laid down by Mr. McCallum, the Patrons of Industry candidate who was elected in East Lambton on Saturday. If the contest had been with a supporter of the Dominion Government there would have been a great difference between the policies of the two men, but with the exception of No. 7 the platform of the Patrons is similar to that advocated by the Reformers of this Country and province. The Patrons policy as published is as follows:—

1. Maintenance of British connection.
2. The reservation of the public lands for the actual settler.
3. Purity of administration and absolute independence of Parliament.
4. Rigid economy in every department of public service.
5. Simplification of the laws and a general reduction in the machinery of Government.
6. The abolition of the Canadian Senate.
7. A system of civil service reform that will give each county power to appoint or elect all county officials paid by them, except county judges.
8. Tariff for revenue only, and so adjusted as to fall as far as possible upon the luxuries and not the necessities of life.
9. Reciprocal trade on fair and equitable terms between Canada and the world.
10. Effectual legislation that will protect labor and the results of labor, from those combinations and monopolies which unduly enhance the price of the articles produced by such combinations or monopolies.
11. Prohibition of the bonusing of railways by Government grants as contrary to the public interest.
12. Preparation of the Dominion and provincial voters' lists by the municipal officers.
13. Conformity of electoral districts to county boundaries as constituted for municipal purposes, as far as the principle of representation by population will allow.

### THE SUN CLOUDED.

The Richmond Hill Liberal has the Globe's statistics re. Catholics employed in the Local House departments. It gives it that there are 544 Protestants and 119 Catholics. What the Liberal should look at is the salaries. The average as we make it is:—Protestant \$405.10, while the Catholic has \$695.75. While Sir Oliver don't employ as many Catholics as Protestants, he pays them better, which is quite a balm for a wounded spirit."

From the above editorial note which appeared in the Markham Sun of last week we must conclude that our eastern luminary is either unjust in its criticisms, is a poor arithmetician, or else liable like other editors to make mistakes. As we have no reason for accusing the editor of unfairness, and as we know nothing of his lack of mathematical ability we surmise that he has been careless in the simple rules of addition and division. By adding up the different salaries of the 544 Protestants referred to in The Sun it will be found that the average salary is \$898.47, whereas the average paid to each Catholic in the same department is \$752.68.

We presume our comem will correct the error so as not to be included among those who have unjustly charged the Mowat Government with giving the principal offices of emolument to members of the Catholic church.

Saturday last was a cold day for the Mowat candidates in East Lambton and North Bruce. In the former constituency Mr. McCallum, the candidate of the P. P. A., was elected over Dr. McKinnon by a majority of 403, and in the latter riding Mr. McNaughton, the Patron of Industry nominee, defeated his opponents by about 400. In Lambton the Conservatives put no man in the field, so it is likely they voted almost solidly for the P. P. A. If the election was won on the score of sectarian prejudice it is to be regretted. It must be remembered, however, that Mr. McCallum being a farmer, probably had an advantage over a professional man in a rural constituency. If it is any consolation to the Grits the successful candidate has always been a Liberal in politics.

In all probability the contest for the Toronto Mayoralty will be between Mr. R. J. Fleming and Mr. Waring Kennedy.

In the November number of Night and Day, which extends to twenty pages, Dr. Barnardo supplies a more than usually striking series of details concerning that great work of child rescue with which his Homes have been for the 28 years past associated. The number opens with an interesting account of the editor's recent experiences in Canada. He reiterates emphatically that out of the 6,571 boys and girls that have been, after training in the Homes, sent out to the Dominion, less than two per cent have failed, while it is added on the official authority of Sir John Carling, Canadian Minister of Agriculture, that only a fraction of one per cent. have gone to form additions to the criminal population of Canada.


