meeting of the rate-payers of the village
of Richmond Hill was held in the Council
Chamber on Monday evening, the 11th
inst., for the purpose of taking into
consideration the advisability of estab-
lishing a Weekly Market in this place.

On motion Mr. Pugsley was appointed
chairman of the meeting and Mr. Nicholls
acted as secretary.

The chairman stated the object of the
meeting, gave his views relative to a
market and asked those present to ex-
press an opinion with reference to the
matter.
Mr. J. H. Sanderson gave several
instances which came under his notice
while travelling in the western part of
the province. In almost every case the
market proved one of the principal draw-
ing cards to the places mentioned.

Mr. Harrison, Mr. Atkinson and
others also expressed themselves as hav-
ing confidence that a weekly market, if
patronized would be beneficial to the
citizens and to the farmers in the sur-
rounding neighborhoods. There is a
good territory to draw from, and many
farmers would seldom go to the city if
they could sell their poultry and other
produce for cash here.

On motion of Mr. Atkinson seconded
by Mr. Palmer it was decided to have a
market on the Wednesday before Christ-
mas, December 20th.

On motion of Mr. Palmer, seconded
by Mr. Atkinson, it was decided to hold
the first market in the Lorne Hall.

On motion of Mr. Sanderson, seconded
by Mr. Boyle, it was decided to ask the
Village Council to meet any expense in
the holding of the first market.

On motion of Mr. Redditt, seconded
by W. Sanderson, Messrs. J. H. Sand-
erson, H. A. Nicholls, W. Atkinson, J.
Palmer, and W. H. Pugsley were ap-
pointed a committee to advertise the
market and make the necessary arrange-
ments.

On motion of T. F. McMahon, seconded
by J. Palmer, the following were ap-
pointed a committee to solicit prizes for
the first market, viz.: J. Switzer, J.
Mortson, C. Mason.

Temperance Hall.

The plebiscite meetings were continued
in the Temperance Hall last evening,
Rev. Wesley Dean being the chief speak-
er. Mr. Wm. Atkinson occupied the
chair. The address was full of "facts
for voters," and the only drawback was
that too small a number of voters was
present to hear the effective arguments.
The speaker showed that temperance men
should not be bound to either party, but
should vote for those representatives who
pledged themselves to throw their in-
fluence in favor of prohibition. The
premier of this province was recorded as
saying that three fourths of the crime
was attributed to strong drink, therefore
he had faith in that gentleman doing all
in his power to suppress the evil. If the
plebiscite is carried by a sweeping ma-
jority so as to show the popular will of
the people, he believed that a stringent
law could be enforced. He gave Neal
Dow and other authorities in Maine to
show that prohibition was a success in
that state after a trial of 39 years. Rev.
Mr. Dean referred to the question of
revenue, the barley question, and took
up several other practical points, which
lack of space prevents our mentioning.

Rev. Dr. Percival followed in a few
remarks which went to show that the
license system was morally wrong, there-
fore should be abolished.

nesday evening will be Rev. J. A. Dun-
lap, of Sherwood.
