in the village.

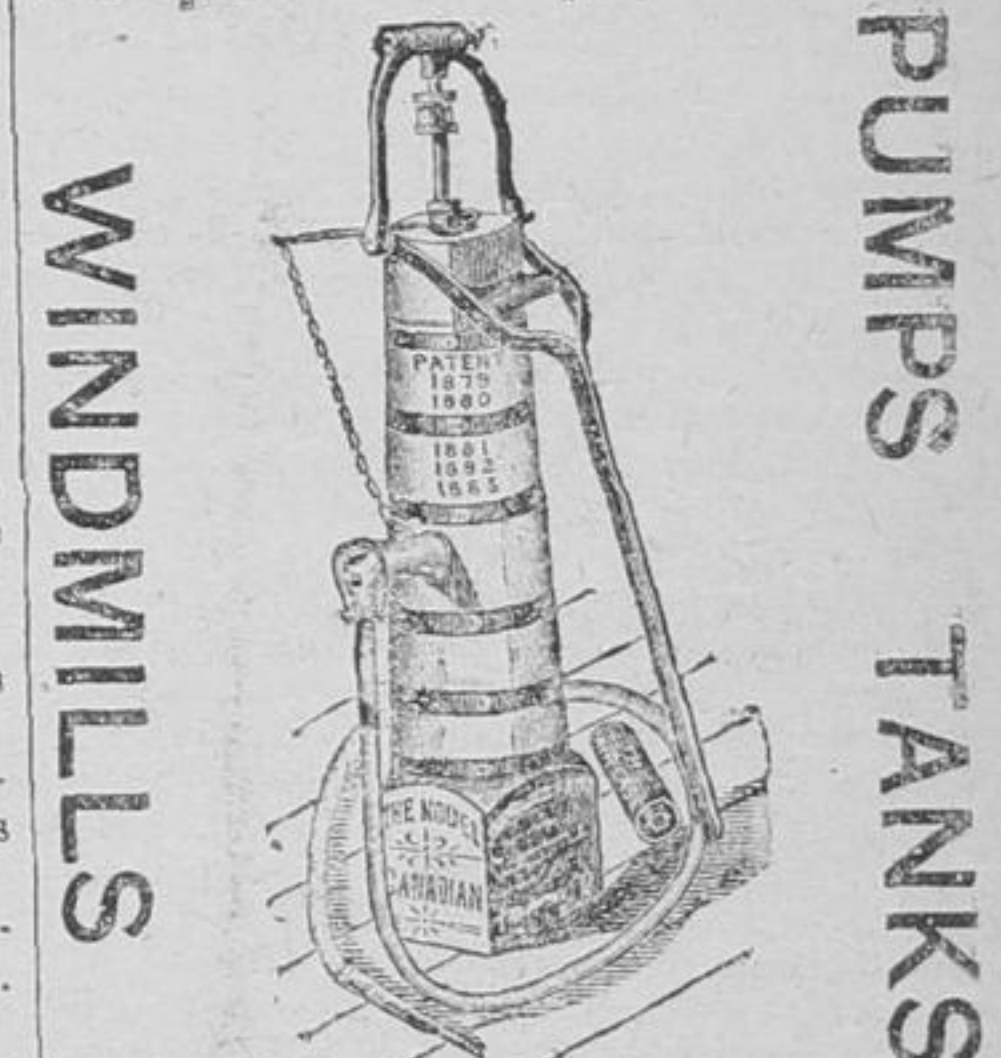
Mr. Tozo Ohno, a graduate of the Univer-
