Relative to the Prohibition Plebiscite to be taken in the various parts of the province on Monday next, we publish sections 4 and 16 of the Act, as there appears to be some doubt in some quarters as to who have votes, and also as to whether persons can be appointed to act as agents if they neglect attending at the Clerk's office on the second Monday in December in accordance with section 12 of the Act.

Section 4 reads: "The persons qualified to vote on the said question, shall be all persons who are at the said date entered on the last voters' list for the municipality, certified by the county judge under the provisions of *The Ontario Voters' List Act, 1889*, as qualified to vote at the elections to serve in the Legislative Assembly, and unmarried women and widows whose names appear on the voters' list as qualified to vote at the election of municipal councillors."

Section 16: "In case no person was appointed as aforesaid or in the absence of any person authorized as aforesaid to attend at a polling place, or at the final summing up of the votes, any elector entitled to vote on the said question or any elector who is in the same interest as the person so absent, may, upon making and subscribing, before the deputy returning officer at the polling place, or the clerk of the municipality, a declaration in the form of Schedule 'B' to this Act, be admitted to the polling place to act for the person so absent."

The worst thing that was said about the Village Council at the nomination on Friday last was that three of the members found it convenient to be away on that day. The reeve and Mr. Palmer were a minority of the council, but they had to speak for the whole number. Municipal Councillors are not expected to neglect their own private business. It is a pity, however, that they have to absent themselves on the day of nomination. They should be prepared on that day to answer any question which the rate-payers might wish to ask them relative to the affairs of the village. The same holds good with reference to school trustees.

Day after day The Globe tries to get The Empire to give an expression of opinion with reference to the platform of the Patrons of Industry and the P. P. A. The Empire's reply is, "We do not desire to intrude at a moment of poignant grief and mental distress." This may be good policy on the part of the Conservative organ, but it can't be called courageous. 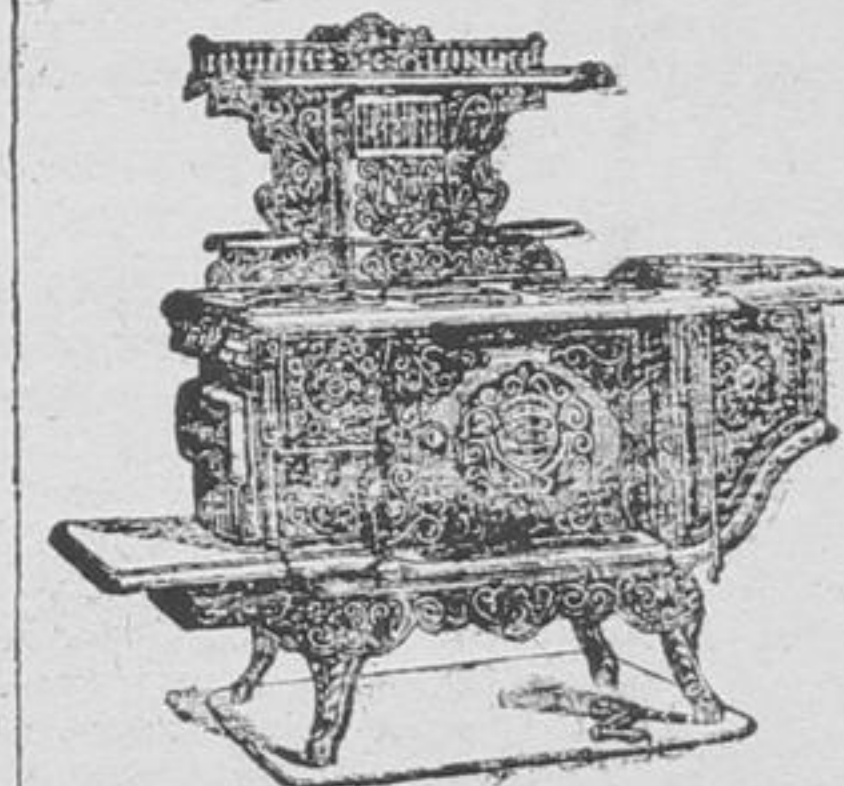
