The Municipal Council of the Town-
ship of Vaughan met at the Town Hall
on Monday, the 15th of January, 1894
Members present: G. W. High, reeve;
Samuel J. Arnold, 1st deputy reeve;
Alex. Bryson, 2nd deputy reeve; Jas. H.
Kirby and Wm. Watson, jr., councillors.
The members elect having executed
the declaration of qualification and of
office took their seats and proceeded to
business.

The following petitions were presented
asking grants to gravel the highways in
the township:
From Isaac Reaman and 25 others for
graveling Thornhill side road; from Jos.
Cox and 36 others for graveling the
same road.

A claim for one sheep killed by dog of
dogs, valued at \$10, and two lambs in-
jured valued at \$2, was presented by
Jacob Williams.

Mr. Kirby, that the treasurer be and is
hereby authorized to pay the following

the Fence-Viewers and Pound Keepers
included in said notices.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by
Mr. Arnold, that J. J. Cameron be and
is hereby appointed caretaker of the Town
Hall for the present year, and that he be
paid \$15 for his services.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by
Mr. Bryson, that the treasurer's bonds
having been examined by the council we
hereby accept the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Arnold, seconded by
Mr. Bryson, that the treasurer is hereby
instructed to continue the funds of the
township deposited in the Dominion
Bank, Toronto, the bank not to pay the
amount received for debentures maturing
unless upon the order of the reeve for
the time being, the bank to deposit the
interest accruing from time to time as it
becomes due to the credit of the township
account in the bank, and that the Clerk
forward a copy of this resolution to the
manager of the Dominion Bank.—Carried.

Vaughan Reformers
The Annual Meeting of the Vaughan
Reform Association was held in the Town
Hall, Vellore, on Wednesday, January
17th. There was a large number present
from all parts of the township, among
whom were noticed the following:
Messrs. G. W. High, A. Shunk, M.
Naughton, R. Rumble, H. Franks, J. H.
Kirby, Alex. Bryson, P. Devins, T.
Webster, N. Stong, W. Delziel, R. Law-
son, R. Witter, C. Hollingshead, A.
Smith, S. McDougall, T. Smith, S. J.
Arnold, H. Creighton, G. Gobiell, J.
McKinnon, J. Stevenson, J. Quantz, J.
Bell, D. McDonald and many others.
Mr. G. W. High was moved to the
chair, and Mr. Frank Smith acted as
secretary.

After the minutes of the last meeting
were read, and the treasurer's report
given, the election of officers for the en-
suing year took place, and resulted as
follows:

President, James Stevenson;
1st Vice-President, Jas. H. Kirby;
2nd Vice-President, James Devins;
Treasurer, John McKinnon;
Secretary, Frank Smith

Last year's officers were re-elected as
chairmen of the different sub-divisions.
This part of the business being over,
good speeches were delivered by Dr.
Gilmour, the popular local member; Mr.
Irwin, of Weston, a clever young bar-
rister; Mr. A. Campbell, of Toronto
Junction, M. P. for Kent; and Mr. J.
R. Miller, barrister, of Eglington.

The speakers referred briefly to the
clean, honest and efficient administration
of Sir Oliver Mowat and his colleagues,
and made a comparison between its re-
cord and that of the Dominion Govern-
ment, much to the disadvantage of the
latter. The speakers spoke confidently
of the result of the next general election,
but said that as the opposition leaders
knew they could not sustain a single
charge made against the Mowat Govern-
ment, they were willing to defeat that
honest statesman by secret and unjust
methods.

At the close of the thanks were ten-
dered to the chairman and to the speak-
ers, and three rousing cheers were given
for Dr. Gilmour.

The feeling of the meeting went to
show that the Reformers of Vaughan
have every confidence in their member,
that they look with entire satisfaction
upon the course he has pursued during
the past eight years, and that they ear-
nestly wish for a continuance of the gov-
ernment of Sir Oliver Mowat which for
over twenty years has conducted the
affairs of this province in a manner
satisfying it to be considered the most wisely
and economically governed province in
the British empire.

for the purpose of lighting, cleaning and
making fires in the Council Chamber
when they hold meetings of the Brigade.
