Unionville, on Monday, the 15th inst.
Members all present. The clerk in the
chair. The following members sub-
scribed to and took the declaration of qualifi-
cation and of office: Jonathan Slater,
reeve; W. Scott, 1st deputy reeve; F. K.
Reesor, 2nd deputy reeve; Jas. Lawrie,
3rd deputy reeve, and A. Quantz, coun-
cillor. The reeve took the chair, and
after addresses by the members, the reg-
ular routine commenced.

A communication was received from
the Single Tax Association requesting
the council to join in petition re. local
option in taxing personal property.

Scott—Reesor—that the treasurer pay
the following amounts, being two thirds
the value of sheep killed and injured by
dogs, the owners unknown, as testified
on oath: E. Wisner, 4 killed and 1 in-
jured, \$30.33; A. T. Moore, 7 killed and
5 injured, \$47.33; D. Ramer, 6 killed,
\$38.33—Carried.

Lawrie—Quantz—that the treasurer
pay R. Harrington the following account
for lumber as certified by R. O.: 990 ft.
4 in. plank to J. Comisky, 1892 ft. 4 in.
plank to R. Goodyear, 500 ft. plank to
Mr. Holden: total 3442 ft. at \$14 per M,
\$48.88—Carried.

Scott—Lawrie—that the treasurer pay
Mr. W. Hood the following amounts for
work done on town line between York
and Markham, and bill York for half the
amount: Drawing plank and repairing
culvert, \$4; repairing road plane belong-
ing to York township, \$2.50—Carried.

Quantz—Reesor—that the treasurer
pay the following gravel accounts as cer-
tified by R. O.: C. P. Read, 70 yards,
T. W. Kink, R. O., \$7; G. Rakor, gravel
furnished div. 49, 45 yards, \$4.50—
Carried.

Mr. Scott asked leave to introduce a
by-law to appoint members of the Board
of Health for 1894. Leave given. By-
law read a first time. On motion by-law
read a second time and council went into
committee of the whole thereon, Mr.
Lawrie in the chair. Committee rose
and reported by-law with blanks filled
with the names of Jonathan Slater, John
Stephenson, David James, Elias Hamil-
ton and Jonathan Nigh. On motion re-
port was received, adopted and by-law
read a third time and passed.

A by-law was passed appointing Thos
Thomson assessor for west half, and An-
thony Forster assessor for east half; au-
ditors, J. F. Davison and D. B. Nigh-
swander.

Scott—Lawrie—that Mr. Reesor be a
commissioner to procure one cord wood
for Mrs. Doheny, an indigent, also to ex-
amine and purchase 3 inch plank from
James Bishop, sum required payable on
his order.

Quantz—Lawrie—that the treasurer
pay Wm. French for 1 gravel pit wedge,
1 25, Jacob Eyer, R. O.

Reesor—Lawrie—that Mr. Scott be a
committee to order from Mr. Baker five
loads of cedar, to be delivered in various
parts of the municipality, sum required
payable on his order.

Reesor—Scott—that the treasurer pay
all official salaries and their expenses as
per by-law 509, incurred by this council
in connection with the Plebisite vote on
the question of the total prohibition of
the liquor traffic as ordered by the Legis-
lature of the Province of Ontario, and
that the seal of the corporation be at-
tached hereto.

Reesor—Lawrie—that the treasurer
pay the Returning Officer the sum of \$1,
horse hire in appointing and distributing
Deputy Returning Officer's ballot boxes
and papers to Div. No. 10.

Scott—Quantz—that when this council
adjourns it stands adjourned until Sat-
urday, Feb. 17th.

Scott—Lawrie—that the Reeve and
Mr. Reesor be a committee to receive
tenders for the township printing for
current year and report at the next meet-
ing of this council.

Council adjourned.
