In the Arst place, why say farmer when the Succession Duties apply to all classes of people? Then again, the ten per cent. referred to only applies to estates where there are no near relatives. Near relatives, such as father, mother, children, husband, wife, &c., pay no duties whatever, except when the estates exceed \$100,000. All property bequeathed or given for religious, charitable or educational purposes is also exempt. And here let us say that since this "iniquitous measure" was passed in Ontario, every other province in the Dominion has passed a law similar to it. We are not aware that the Patrons have ever opposed it.

The Leader evidently thinks the Patrons are easily satisfied relative to the tariff changes. It says: "The farmers have got all they asked for -what more could they want?" In another place it says that "the Dominion tariff is a tariff for revenue only." The Patrons know well that the Dominion tariff is a tariff to proof the farmers.

The Leader gives several other reasons why the Patrons of Industry should follow Mr. St. John and, the Conservative party, but we are bound to say they are all as misleading as those to which we have referred: When it next professes to give reasons why its candidate should receive
