York County Patrons.

A meeting of delegates from the York County lodges of the Patrons of Industry was held on Tuesday afternoon, the 31st ult., at Agincourt, at which there was a fair representation from every township. County President Forster occupied the chair, and among others, County Organizer Sisley and Secretary J. C. Clark were present. The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the general political situation, and considering questions which will come both before the Federal and Provincial Houses. The question of putting Patron candidates in the field for the York constituencies was considered. The expressed sense of the meeting that the approaching Dominion elections should be a struggle on the part of the Patrons against tariff regulations was endorsed. It was decided that organizers should be appointed for every township in the county, and that as soon as the busy season was ended they should begin work. It was also decided that a meeting should be held not later than the first of next January, at which the order should decide definitely what steps should be taken in regard to the next Federal elections. There are now in the County of York twenty lodges in good standing, with an average membership of about twenty, and this number will, it is expected, be increased as soon as the organizers get to work.

John Forester Drowned.

A sad accident occurred in the pond on Dixon's hill, near Ringwood, on Wednesday evening of last week, when John Forester, son of George Forester, near Gormley, was drowned while bathing. Deceased, who was 29 years of age, was swimming with three other young men, and after crossing the pond, some of them commenced to dress. Forester, however, said he would cross once The Sunday School of Trinity Church, more. As it was now about dark, and as he did not return, his companions became anxious, and began to make a search along the banks, but were unsuccessful. Next morning the water was lowered, the pond dragged, and the body was found. It is supposed the unfortunate young man took cramps while crossing a cold current of water that runs through the pond, and sank without giving any alarm. Deceased had gone only about a week before the accident to work a farm for his uncle, Mr. John Grabam. The body was removed to the old homestead near Victoria Square, from which place the funeral took place on Saturday to the Dunker cemetery. Rev. Mr. Vickery preached a funeral sermon, and Revs. Messrs. Elliott and Dean also took part in the solemn obsequies. As might be supposed the funeral was yery large, deceased having been a popular young man, and the whole family highly respected.

R. C. Picnic.

The picnic held in the driving park on Monday last under the auspices of the R. C. Church, the preliminary arrangements for which had been made by Rev. Father Mc-Mahon, the genial and popular priest of the congregation, was a great success. Considering the busy season of the year the crowd was large. Among the clergy present were Very Rev. Dean Egan, of Barrie; Rev. J. R. Teefy, of St. Michael's College; Rev. Dr. Tracy of St. Mary's, Toronto; Rev. Father Morris, of Newmarket; and Rev. Father Killcullen, of Adjala. The proceeds of the day amounted to about \$500 which will be in aid of the new church in course of erection here, and which will, it is hoped, be completed before the cold weather sets in. Besides the gate receipts and the proceeds from the tea, a good deal of money was made by grab bags, mail deliveries, bouquets, etc., \$202 being collected by two young ladies in a competition for an easy chair. In this contest Miss McWilliams collected \$96, while Miss Cooney, of Toronto, her successful rival, had \$106. A good many attended the picnic to see the lacrosse match between Markham and Richmond Hill. Markhain team being two men short the game was played with ten men on a side. Richmond Hill took the first two games in 20 and 8 minutes, Lyons and Shierk doing the scoring. Markham took the 3rd and 4th games in 10 and 5 minutes, making the result a draw. Both teams seemed in poor condition and the result was a slow game. Richmond Hill relied too much on individual play, Markham playing a better team game. In the bicycle race C. Church will be held in Ardagh's grove, G. A. Rolling took first money, R. Stark second, and Mosley third. The horse racing furnished capital sport, although some of the inexperienced spectators could not understand why the judges rang back the horses so many times.
