**IMMIGRATION PROSPECTS.**

**The Reports from This Side Have Given a Check to Emigration.**

The British emigration returns show that from January 1 to July 31 of this year 77,567 persons left the United Kingdom as against 130,524 during the same period last year. South Africa alone attracted more immigration, the figures for the United States falling from 96,972 to 50,372, Canada from 16,973 to 10,361, and Australia from 5,527 to 4,964. Canada has undoubtedly suffered from the reports of the severe business depression in the States, "America" being a vague general expression in the minds of the emigrating classes in the old country, where a surprising amount of ignorance of Canada and its affairs still prevails. The alarming reports sent over the Atlantic from the States and from the wheat-growing districts of the West on both sides of the line have given a decided check to emigration generally. The workmen of Great Britain are beginning to think that they are better off where they are. The well-organized and wealthy trades unions now exercise tremendous power and secure good conditions of labor and a fair rate of wages. Rent is low, and clothes and other necessities of life cheap. The agricultural laborer, by joining the industrial ranks in the great cities at home, thinks he secures better prospects for himself and his children than by taking up land in the West. In view of the pressure of the agricultural population on the labor markets of the cities, and the outcries of the employes against the tyranny of the unions, it is a question whether this state of things can continue long, but for the present, in default of special inducements on this side and special incentives at home, it is evident that only a moderate number of immigrants can be expected.

**Beef Pie.**

A great meat pie is "hearty" and tasty. Make the paste as follows: Chop four ounces of beef suet and put in a stew-pan with the same quantity of butter and a pint of water; when boiling pass through a sieve into two pounds of flour and stir with a spoon until cool; roll out and line a large earthen pudding dish with it. Fill the centre with seasoned and floured strips of rump steak alternately with layers of thinly sliced potatoes; cover with some of the paste, make a hole in the centre and bake three hours and a half in a moderate oven. Make gravy from bones and pour in when the pie is done.
