## A NEW FIEND.

The Sampogna Player Has Made His Way to This Country.

A new street nuisance has arrived in this country in the shape of a band of Italian because of the prejudice against their race due to the assassination of President Carnot by Caserio, who abhor the organ and essay to delight the ear with more musical, i more primitive, instruments, which they play with skill.

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
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
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
