MR. HOBBS FOR LONDON.

Mr. Hobbs, Liberal, was yesterday elected in London, for the Ontario Legislature, over his opponent, Mayor Essery, Conservative, by a majority of over 800. The result is a victory for justice and honest government, and it is a blow at prejudice and intolerance. The defeated candidate was a prominent member of the P. P. A. which seems to have been a weakness rather than a source of strength to him. Mr. Marter spoke for him a few nights ago, and as the newly appointed leader of the Opposition declared against Separate Schools, some of the Conservative papers were foolish enough to think Mr. Essery's chances for election were greater. The Evening News of Monday also stated that Mayor Essery was gaining ground rapidly, and that he would certainly win because he had declared for the abolition of Separate Schools. It is a great wonder that men do not learn that keeping such questions before the people is merely a source of irritation, and that no good can result from the feeble agitation.

Some time ago The Advocate, the organ of the liquor traffic, somewhat startled temperance people by making the assertion that the average age of total abstainers was less than that of those who were decidedly intemperate. The inference was either that abstinence had a tendency to shorten life, or that drinking habits tended to longevity. The Templar called for proof to substantiate the statement, whereupon The Advocate directed its cotem. to a report made by the British Medical Association. Dr. Owen, who prepared the report, writes under his own signature, showing that the figures given are misleading, and that "habitual indulgence in alcoholic liquors beyond the most moderate amounts has a distinct tendency to shorten life." The Advocate last week practically admitted that the report was inaccurate, but that the error was made through a garbled telegram.

Why don't the Dominion Government appoint a collector for the port of Montreal? Why don't they open Quebec west? Why don't they appoint the Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba? But what is the use of interrogating when we know the answer? They are afraid. They dare not open Cardwell, which would be necessitated by the appointment of Mr. White, M. P., collector of customs at Montreal. They dare not open Quebec west for they fear the Liberals would take the constituency from them. The same may be said of appointing Mr. Ross to the Lieut.-Governorship of Manitoba, which would necessitate the opening of Lisgar. They are a cautious lot.

Independence seems to be a Liberal characteristic. If you do not believe this to be a fact, question yourself and look about among your friends. You seldom find a Liberal who has not the courage of his convictions, and he will stand by them and await the result. This is a commendable trait in his character, but it is not always a winning card. The average Conservative is more inclined to sacrifice his individuality and follow his leader.

Markham Township Council met at Unionville on Saturday, Nov. 17th, at 10:30 a. m. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed. Scott—Reesor—moved that in regard to the claims of R. A. Mason and R.

Welsh for damages alleged to have been sustained through a broken culvert on con. 9, this council denies any liability in the matter, but to avoid the expense of a law suit offers, without prejudice, \$125 in full settlement of all claims in connection with the matter, and that the Reeve and Mr. Lawrie be and are hereby appointed commissioners to defend the case should this offer be not accepted and legal proceedings taken against the municipality.—Carried.

Mr. Scott introduced a by-law to provide for the holding of municipal elections for 1895. The by-law received its three several readings and was passed, and the Reeve authorized to sign the same. Council then adjourned.

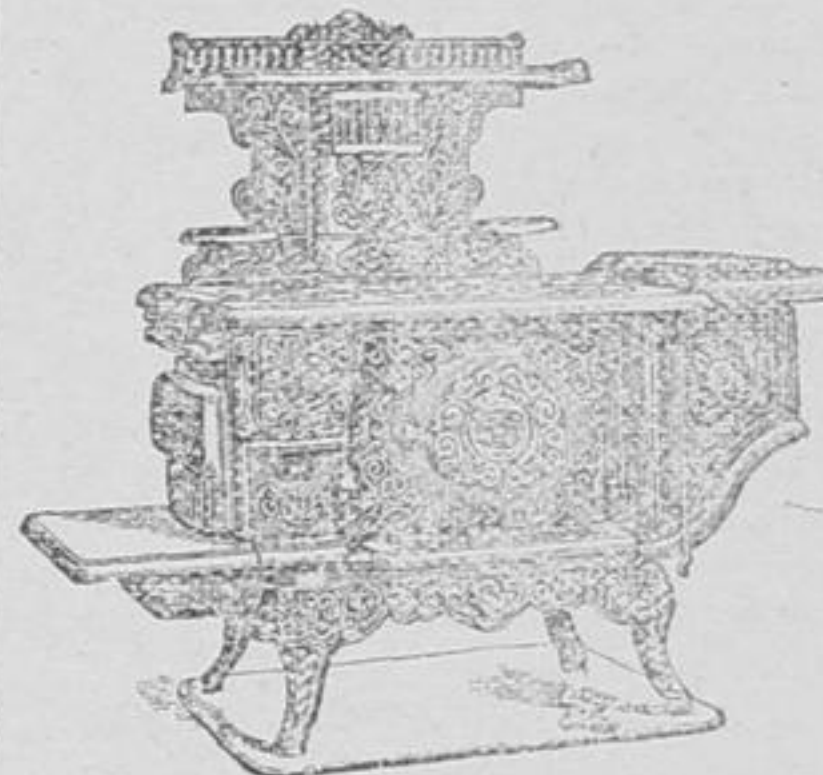
