RICHMOND HILL, Thursday, Jan. 10, '95  
TORONTO'S GREAT FIRE.

One of the most disastrous fires in the history of Toronto broke out in the basement of The Globe Office on Sunday morning, about 3 o'clock. The total loss will be about three-quarters of a million dollars. One fireman was killed while on duty, and several others were seriously injured. There was a strong wind blowing at the time, and had it not been for the three or four inches of snow on the roofs of the neighboring buildings, it is more than probable that the whole of the western part of the city would have been destroyed. The largest of the individual losses are the Globe Printing Company, \$160,000; N. Rooney, Dry Goods, \$50,000; Harry Webb, \$80,000; Brough & Caswell, printers, 25,000; Miller & Richards, \$50,000; McKinnon & Co., Dry Goods, \$175,000.

All the large newspaper managers threw their doors open to the Globe, and rendered them all the assistance it was possible to give. The offer of The Empire was accepted, and The Globe came out on Monday morning as usual.

**Division Court.**

Division Court was held here on Tuesday. In the absence of the county judge, Lawyer Tait presided. The court room was filled most of the day with apparently interested spectators. The following are some of the most important cases:—

Rumble v. Noble & Watson—The plaintiff claimed \$10 in exchange of horses. Judgment was given for \$5 against defendant Noble.

Langstaff v. W. and R Pearson—Claim for medical attendance of members of family. Judgment for plaintiff for \$9.00. The judge stated that although they were not legally responsible for the balance, it would be to their credit to pay the whole account.

Morgan v. Soules & Montgomery et al—This was an interpleader suit for \$104.58. The case was adjourned to be tried before the judge in Chambers, Toronto.

Clark v. Wilson—Plaintiff's claim of \$2.00. Judgment for defendant.

Muldoon v. Frisby—The plaintiff who sued for \$4, got judgment for \$3.

Besides the above there were several judgment summon's cases.
