ANOTHER GREAT FIRE.

Toronto was again visited by fire last Thursday evening, and the loss is even greater than that of the preceding Sunday. The fire broke out in the Osgoodby Building on Melinda street, and rapidly spread to the adjoining warehouses, in spite of the efforts of the firemen who worked manfully to save life and property. Fortunately, as at the previous fire, there was a quantity of snow and sleet on the roofs of the buildings which prevented the flying cinders taking fire where they alighted. There was no loss of life in the second fire, but the escape of three persons from the upper story of the Osgoodby Building was almost miraculous. Mrs. Caven, the caretaker's wife, jumped from a window, and was caught in a net below, after which the husband and a nurse slid down the electric wire for some distance and fell into the net.

The following buildings were destroyed:—

Osgoodby Building, Melinda street, in which 15 firms had offices.

Brereton & Manning, wholesale furs, 24-26 Wellington street.

Thomas Dunnett & Co., wholesale furs, 30 Wellington street.

Boisseau & Co., wholesale clothing, 32 Wellington street.

Robert Darling & Co., wholesale woollens, 34 Wellington street.

R. H. Gray & Co., whitewear, 24-26 Wellington street.

Hart & Riddell, wholesale stationers, 27 Wellington street.

The loss is estimated at upwards of three-quarters of a million dollars. The want of powerful steam fire engines was greatly felt, as with the water power the streams could not be made to reach the flames in the highest stories.

THE PROVINCE POWERLESS.

The Supreme Court of Canada has at last given its decision on the temperance questions submitted to the members of the court. The court were unanimous in their opinion that the Provincial Legislature has no jurisdiction to prohibit the manufacture and importation of intoxicating liquors in the province. By a majority of 3 to 2 they also decided that a Provincial Legislature has not power to prohibit the sale of liquors, either wholesale or retail.

It will be remembered that last year when Mr. Marter introduced his bill in which he proposed to prohibit all sale by retail within the province, it was pointed out by Attorney-General Mowat that the jurisdiction of the province was, to say the least, doubtful, and the recent decision of the Supreme Court goes to show the wisdom of his contention. Had the Marter bill been passed there would have been no licenses issued, and by the recent decision of the court, there would be practically free sale in liquor from one end of the province to the other.

The question will in all probability be taken to the Privy Council of England, where the Supreme Court decision may be reversed, but as the case stands now the province has only the power to regulate the traffic.

With the more than ordinary bustle on both sides of politics, it looks as if a general election for the Dominion is near at hand. Candidates should be placed in the field at once, if they are not already nominated. The chances are that another session of the present parliament will not be held.
