Proposed Reading Room.
 A meeting of the directors of the Mechanics' Institute was held in the Library Room on Friday evening, with a view of establishing a Free Reading Room in connection with the Institute. The following directors were present:—Messrs. Storey, Pugsley, Savage, McConagh, Law, Nichol, Robertson, Langstaff, McMahon, Rev. W. Dean was also present. Before the question of a reading room was taken up, Mr. H. Moore, representative for The Mail and Empire, introduced an Encyclopaedia Britannica, the price of which was \$51 cash, or \$55 in instalments. The directors passed a resolution recommending that the work be purchased next May. Mr. Dean, being called upon, made a strong plea for a reading room, saying that often young men spent much of their time in hotels and in stores, where they were not wanted, simply because there was no suitable place to congregate. All the members present agreed that it was desirable to establish a reading room if the necessary expenses could be annually raised, and a committee was appointed to circulate a petition among the rate-payers to be presented to the village council, asking that body for an appropriation of \$50.00, which would be about half the amount required for the first year. Since the above was put in type the council met and made a grant of \$25 for the first six months.

A Suggestion.

The International Sunday School Lesson Committee have made provision for a lesson on the subject of Temperance or Purity of Life in each quarter's lessons. We think that it would be instructive to all for the Sabbath Schools to unite occasionally and meet in some public hall or churches alternately to be addressed on the subject selected for the day by ministers, teachers and others. East York Liberals.

Notwithstanding the fact that it was generally known that Hon. Wilfred Laurier, on account of ill health, would not be at Markham on Saturday last, there was a great demonstration in our sister village, in honor of Mr. H. R. Frankland, East York's worthy candidate for the House of Commons. The special train brought hundreds of representative men from the southern part of the riding, as well as many from Toronto. When the special train arrived, a procession was formed in which were over 200 on horseback. The procession, headed by the Markham band, moved to the large Agricultural Hall, which was soon filled to the doors. After an appropriate remarks by Mr. F. Underhill, President of the Young Men's Liberal Club, rousing speeches were made by Mr. Frankland; Mr. G. B. Smith, ex-M. P.P.; Hon. G. W. Ross, Dr. Conlter, Mr. J. D. Edgar, M. P., and Mr. John Richardson, M. P.P. The speakers were forceful in arraiving the government's policy, contrasting the promises made by the leaders in 1878, with the result of those promises. The principal political questions were dealt with in a convincing manner, with the trade policy well to the front. Mr. Frankland had to listen to many complimentary remarks relative to his public and private career, by Mr. Smith, Mr. Richardson, Mr. Edgar and others, and every person seemed to think that the event on Saturday was an indication of victory for the Liberal candidate and the principles which he advocates, at the General election.
