The report of the Prohibition Commission has been completed, and handed in to the Dominion Government. The Majority Report is in 5 volumes, containing 7000 pages, and this, with Dr, Macleod's minority Re-000. The population of prohibition states is one-twelfth of the whole country. In regard to Maine, it should be borne in mind that importation of liquors into that state is practically free. The effect of the Maine law upon all classes of the community, and upon the commercial and moral life of the people is fully set forth as well as the statistics of crime, pauperism, and illicit liquor selling. The commissioners cannot avoid the conviction that the prohibition law of Maine, despite defects and many infractions, has been, and is a marked success. The condition of affairs in Vermont, New Hampshire, Iowa and Kansas, is exhaustively discussed, and the result of his observation in the prohibitory states visited by the commission have not impressed him that the law in any one of them is perfect, either in construction or operation. Other things being equal, it would be reasonable to expect better general results from a law enforced under the Canadian political system.

At the last session of the Ontario Legislature an Act was passed which makes a considerable change in the basis on which the Government grant is hereafter to be paid to Mechanics' Institutes. Formerly, the Government gave a grant on the basis of membership, as well as a grant for the purchase of books. In future the FINEST TEA sum of one dollar will be allowed for every dollar expended in the purchase of books, but so as not to exceed \$200 in the case of cities, \$150 in the case of towns, and in all other cases \$100. The Richmond Hill Public Library will therefore lose its annual grant of \$50 for membership. Whilst we are not prepared to say

that the Government is acting unfairly towards the former Mechanics' Institutes, there is no doubt that the change in the law will be the means of wiping out many public libraries in small places. For many years the Government has been most liberal with regard to the encouragement of good reading matter.


