Newton were present to support the call from Richmond Hill, and Thornhill was represented by Messrs. D. Smellie, R. Cox, and H. W. Harper.

### Fatal Accident.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Barker, of Orillia, will be sorry to learn of the sad death of their little daughter Florence, four years of age. ### Board of Education.

McLean was appointed assistant examiner for the High School Entrance Examinations. On motion of Mr. McConaghy, seconded by Mr. Newton, it was decided that each candidate at the Entrance Examination shall pay the sum of \$1, which sum, however, to be allowed off the first quarter's fee should the candidate afterwards attend High School. On motion of Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Lynet, the Principal of the Public School was instructed to collect 25 cents a month for non-resident pupils attending this school and to make a report to the treasurer at the end of every quarter. The Committee of Management were authorized to prepare the room for the departmental examinations so that all candidates shall be 5 feet apart. The committee were also authorized to have shutters or blinds placed on the west windows of the Public School.
