MR. COBURN CONDEMNED.

Rev. John Hunt, a former pastor of Richmond Hill circuit, has a letter in The Globe of Tuesday, condemning Rev. Mr. Cobourn's sermon preached on Sunday, the 11th inst., to a body of Orangemen and Lady True Blues, in the city. Methodists are not given to abuse of their Catholic friends, neither do they look upon nuns and sisters of charity as other than women who are engaged in a most noble and christian work, therefore members of the Methodist body will be pleased to see ministers of the gospel like Rev. Mr. Hunt, and others, condemn the utterances of the foolish young man. Only bigots—and we regret to say there are many of them—indulge in, or even listen to, the vilifying of self-sacrificing women who spend much of their time in administering to the wants of those stricken with disease. The Rev. Mr. Hunt closes his letter as follows:

"I want to say in conclusion—and I know whereof I affirm—there are Roman Catholic sisterhoods in this city who are doing as noble and blessed work for education and Christian charity as can be done by pure and accomplished Christian women. I confess I blush with shame to think that utterances such as have called forth this letter should ever have been made."
