The Board of Education held a special meeting on Thursday last. Members present: Messrs. W. H. Glass, T. Palmer, Geo. McDonald, J. Switzer, J. Boyle, W. T. Storey, F. McConaghy, and A. Newton. Minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted. Accounts from T. F. McMahon, amounting to \$5.50 and \$2.50, for printing and supplies, were read, and on motion were ordered to be paid. Members of the board explained that changes in the school regulations had been recently made, 5 or 6 new subjects were being added to the programme, and that the high school inspectors were urging upon them the necessity of more accommodation. A resolution was finally carried appointing the chairman, secretary, and Mr. Newton to meet the village council relative to a grant of money for increased accommodation.

Village Council.

A special meeting of the council was held on Monday evening, 27th of April, in the Council Chamber, to receive a committee of the Board of Education relating to the high school.

The council was addressed by Mr. W. H. Glass, Mr. Switzer (secretary of the board); M. Naughton, Esq.; Mr. Ernest Coombs, Head Master of the high school, and other members of the board.

They reported to the council that the high school inspector, Mr. Hodgson, said that more high school accommodation must be provided. Mr. Coombs gave his calculations as to the probable cost of increased expenses thereof.

The clerk read the minutes of the 12th of March, which were approved.

Moved by Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Savage, that the request of the Board of Education for the increased accommodation required for the high school be received, and that the council take it into their most serious consideration.—Carried.

The following accounts were read: H. Griffith, for shovelling snow, \$5 65; H. Blanchard, the same, \$21; A. H. Coombs, gravel, \$7 20; J. Hall, oil for street lamps, \$10 17; J. Brownlee, work on rink, \$23 50.

On motion of Mr. Palmer, seconded by Mr. Sanderson, the foregoing accounts were ordered to be paid.—Carried.

The council adjourned.

Our Poor Children

In order to give some of the poor children of the city an opportunity of getting a little fresh air during the hot summer months and enable them to get away into the country, where they will get plenty of good milk and bread, a proposal has been made to start a fund for that purpose, by one person undertaking to send 60, during the latter part of June and all of July and August, in batches of 10 or 15 at a time, for ten days each, to farm houses, where they will be well cared for.

Their railway fare will be paid both ways, but only those can be accepted who are vouched for by Christian workers, and who are really in need of a change.

Any farmer who reads this and who can take two or more of them, is requested to write and say what terms he will take them on for the ten days. As soon as one band returns, another will be sent.
