A Notable Publication.

"A Study of the Pentateuch," a 40 cent issue of "The Anti-Infidels Library," of H. L. Hastings, Boston, Mass., is probably the best popular work ever written on the conservative side of Biblical criticism. The work consists of a series of lectures delivered some years ago by Dr. Rufus P. Stebbins, president of Meadville (Pa.) Theological School, and notwithstanding this distinguished divine's connection with the Unitarian body, he is unable to accept the contentions of the so-called "Higher Critics," and his work is a masterly refutation of the destructive theories, so ardently advocated by many of his denomination. Mr. Hastings deserves the thanks of Christians everywhere for adding this book to his famous "Anti-Infidels Library."
