**SETTLED AT LAST.**

The late Conservative Government grappled with the Manitoba school question for several years without being able to effect a settlement. When Mr. Laurier came into power on the 23rd of June he pledged his word that the vexed question would be settled inside of six months. The limit of that time has not yet been reached, but the school question is settled, and is by most people thought to be settled satisfactorily. It cannot be denied the settlement is a compromise, but this need surprise no one who has studied the question and learned the great difference of opinion of those for and against Separate schools. By the settlement the Public school system is upheld, at the same time special securities are given to Roman Catholics.

Religious teaching may be given in the schools from 3.30 to 4 o'clock in case a majority of the school trustees desire it, or the trustees will be forced to grant the request on being petitioned by the parents or guardians of at least ten children attending the school in the case of a rural district, or twenty-five children in the case of a city town or incorporated village.

In any schools in towns and cities where the average attendance of Roman Catholic children is forty or upwards, and in villages and rural districts where the average attendance of such children is twenty-five or upwards, the Trustees shall if required by the petition of the parents or guardians of such number of Roman Catholic children, respectively employ at least one duly-certified Roman Catholic teacher in such school. An exactly similar provision is made for the appointment of non-Roman Catholic teachers in schools in districts where the Roman Catholic rate-payers and scholars are in a majority.

**THE FIRST CAR.**

On Monday, the 26th of October, the first sod of the Metropolitan Railway extension, from York Mills to this village, a distance of nearly ten miles, was turned, and on Thursday night last, the 19th inst., between 9 and 10 o'clock, the first car reached here on the newly-laid rails. Naturally, there was a good deal of excitement when it was learned that the car was on the road, and many cheers were given for the Metropolitan Railway Company and Mr. Moyes, as the genial and energetic manager, passed through on the first railway car ever seen in Richmond Hill.

It is needless to say the overhead wires are not yet erected all along the line, so to be true to their contract the car had to be drawn through by horses instead of electricity, which will follow in a few weeks if the weather keeps favorable. Two trips a day are now being made, and the roadbed is getting in very good condition. The arrival of every car is watched with interest, but the opening ceremony will not be inaugurated until the electric system is put in operation.

The settlement of the Manitoba school question seems to meet with the approval of both Catholics and Protestants, generally speaking. But that the settlement does not suit extremists on both sides is evident from the fact that Archbishop Langvin, from his pulpit in St. Boniface, Winnipeg, told his people that a revolution would take place on the banks of the St. Lawrence, and on

the other hand, some extreme Protestants of Hargrave, Manitoba, held an indignation meeting and burned effigies of Hon. Mr. Laurier and Hon. Mr. Sifton.

**THE LIBERAL \$1.00 per Year.**

**A BY-LAW No.**

A By-Law to raise by way of loan, the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars over and above the sums required for the ordinary expenditure of the County of York.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the County of York deems it necessary to raise, by way of loan, the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars for purposes over and above the sums required for the ordinary expenditure of the said County;  
AND WHEREAS it will require a total amount of \$29,745,658.00 for paying the said debt of Twenty Thousand Dollars, and interest thereon at four per cent per annum, payable half yearly;  
AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole ratable property of the County of York according to the last revised and equalized assessment roll is \$29,745,658.00;  
AND WHEREAS the existing debt of the County of York is \$36,227,750, and there is no principal or interest in arrears thereon;

IT IS THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of York:—

(1) It shall be lawful for the Warden of the County of York to raise by way of loan from any person or corporation who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the debentures hereinafter mentioned, the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars for purposes over and above the sums required for ordinary expenditure.  
(2) It shall be lawful for the Warden to cause a series of debentures to be made for the amount of the said sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars according to the following schedule:—

and the said debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the Municipal Corporation of the County of York and shall be signed by the Warden and countersigned by the Treasurer thereof.  
(3) The said debentures shall be payable upon the days and times hereinbefore specified, at the Office of the Treasurer of the County of York, in the City of Toronto, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest.

(4) The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum from the date thereof, which interest shall be payable half yearly on the 30th day of June and the 31st day of December in each year, at the said Treasurer's Office.  
(5) There shall be raised in each year, during the currency of the said debentures, the sum of \$1804.00, which annual sum shall be sufficient to discharge the several instalments of principal and interest according to the terms thereof, and the said instalments and interest shall, respectively, become payable according to the terms thereof.

(6) The said annual sum of \$1804.00 shall be raised and levied in each year by a special rate sufficient therefor, on all the ratable property in the Municipality.

(7) This By-Law shall take effect, and come into operation the 1st day of March, in the year of our Lord 1897.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-Law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of York, at the Council Chamber, in the Court House, in the City of Toronto, in the said County, on Monday, the 1st day of February, 1897, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purposes aforesaid.

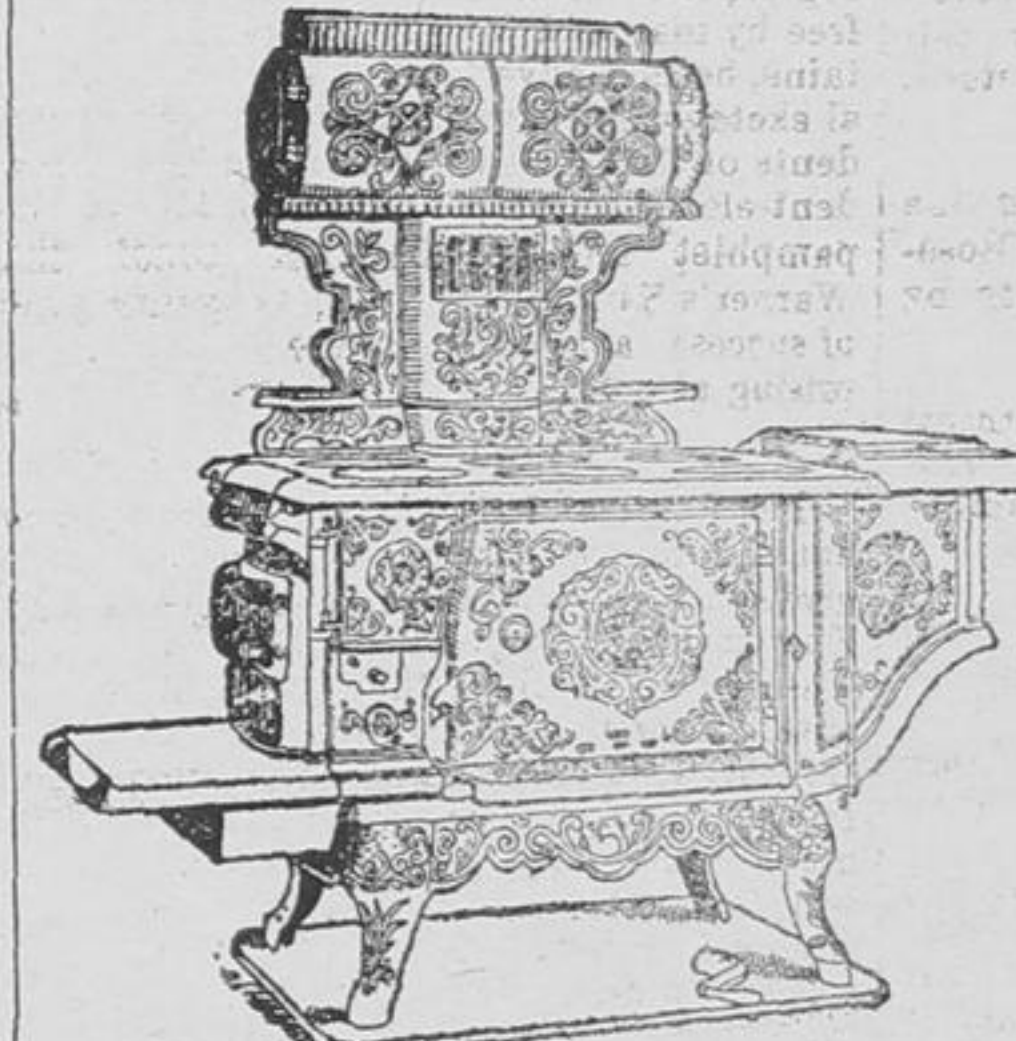
