### County Council Notes

At the recent session of the York County Council it was decided to memorialize the Legislature to change the law which at present compels the County to give a yearly grant to the maintenance of the Toronto Junction High School.

The following are the fees received from the pupils and the salaries paid to the teachers in the different High Schools for 1895:—

The application of Newmarket for an increased grant was not entertained, nor the request of Woodbridge for a grant in aid of the "continuation" class—mainly on the ground that none can be made until a legislative grant has first been made.
