INTEMPERATE CONDUCT.

All true temperance men must regret that certain members of the deputation who waited on the Ontario Government on Thursday to protest against the proposed license bill did not show that courtesy to Mr. Hardy that is due the premier of the greatest province of the Dominion. The public had a right to expect that a deputation of gentlemen were present at the Parliament House to address a Government composed of gentlemen. It would be a mistake, however, to hold the temperance party, or even the whole deputation responsible for the conduct of a few of its members. Their action in hissing the utterances of the premier has been condemned by many newspapers that have a love for fair play and good manners. Relative to the above the Evening News of Friday contained the following editorial notes:

"It is to be regretted that some of the hot-headed members of the temperance deputation which waited upon Mr. Hardy yesterday so far forgot themselves as to hiss at the premier's utterances. They were present as the guests of the Government, and the ill-mannered conduct of those who did the hissing brought reproach upon the entire company. The cause of temperance reform can not be advanced by ebullitions of this character; rather will it be hindered, for those who display such intemperance of conduct do not inspire the respect of the community or of public men, upon whom they must depend for the assistance necessary for the success of their aims."

A controversy has been going on for the past ten days over a speech attributed to Major McGillivray, ex-M. P. for North Ontario, and Supreme Secretary of the Independent Order of Foresters. It has been charged that Mr. McGillivray at the opening of a Court in Chicago, a few days before, came out squarely in favor of the annexation of Canada with the United States. The alleged speech was printed in a Chicago paper and copied by the Toronto World. As the Major denied the correctness of the report, and as the World had been drawn over the coals by The Mail and Empire, a World reporter was sent to Chicago to endeavor to ascertain the facts of the case. The reporter waited on Mr. W. P. Clancy, Chief Ranger of the court that was opened by Mr. McGillivray, who affirms that the report given in the newspapers was substantially correct.

THE LIBERAL does not look upon Mr. McGillivray as one of the highest types of manhood. His course on many subjects has been very erratic. Nevertheless in the present case we are inclined to give him the benefit of the doubt in the absence of stronger evidence than that of Mr. Clancy. The latter stands condemned as a bigot by his own words. To the World reporter Mr. Clancy said: "For myself, I could not let the opportunity pass without saying there that I have the utmost contempt for Her Majesty's Government, and that I consider the British flag the symbol of tyranny and oppression the world over." &c.

A great deal of dissatisfaction exists in consequence of an attempt by the city of Toronto to enforce a special act of the Ontario Legislature which provides for the inspection and testing by tuberculin of all dairy cows. The city Board of Health has prepared a form of certificate and is enforcing the act. Many farmers and others supplying milk to the city are up in arms, and meetings are being held throughout the county. The

principal objection is the expense which must be borne by the owners of the cows, the charge for testing one cow being \$2.50, five cows \$7.50, and for fifteen or over 75 cents each. It is also claimed that tuberculin is not a sure test, and that in many cases the operation is injurious to the cows.

It is always well to guard the public health as much as possible, but if, as it is claimed, little or no tuberculosis exists in this county it is a pity that dairymen should be put to trouble, annoyance and unnecessary expense.

The property holders of Toronto Junction can scarcely be envied in the position in which they now find themselves. The assessment of the town is two millions of dollars, and their debt is one million. This means that every man's property is mortgaged to half its value. The bond-holders threaten to sue for the large amount of interest due, in fact the town property is practically in the hands of the sheriff. There are over twenty teachers employed in the Public School and Collegiate Institute and it is said they have not received any part of their salary since last November, for the reason that there is no money in the treasury.

An expression of sympathy for a neighboring town would be of no avail at this trying moment. Their unfortunate predicament, however, should cause other towns and villages to stop and think before plunging into large debts and doubtful undertakings.

The Council met on the 13th inst. at the call of the Reeve. Present, the Reeve, Councillors Palmer, Sanderson and Wright.

The Clerk read the following communication: "Toronto, March 11th, 1897. Dear Sir:—By direction of the Legislation Committee, I give you notice that the Bills respecting North Toronto and the Townships of Scarborough and York will come before the Private Bills Committee, at the Legislative Buildings, at ten o'clock on Wednesday morning next, the 17th inst. These Bills all contain sections enacting that the County of York must pay to each of the Municipalities mentioned, a certain sum of money per annum to compensate them for having to maintain that portion of the York roads within the limits of the municipality. Scarborough wants \$2000, North Toronto \$800 and York, \$2,700, each year, so that if the proposed Bill is carried, it will entail a large annual charge on every Municipality in the County.

The Legislation Committee have decided that it would be in the interests of the minor Municipalities if they would send their Reeves down to a meeting, to be held in the office of the County Clerk on Tuesday morning next at ten o'clock. After that on the same day, an appointment has been made at which the Government may be interviewed, and on the following day, if you think it desirable, you can appear before the Private Bills Committee.
