A Richmond Hill Boy Abroad.
Mr. Hugh McConaghy, son of our esteemed townsman, Mr. F. McConaghy, who is now in Britain with the Crescent Lacrosse Club of Brooklyn, N. Y. is receiving great praise as a lacrosse player by the English papers. In reporting a match The Manchester Guardian of 6th April said of him: "Undoubtedly the best man they have is H. McConaghy. This player is, however, a Canadian, and has for two seasons played with the famous Toronto team. Always where he is wanted, McConaghy has a splendid reach, and his marvellous catching and throwing are unequalled by any English player. On Saturday he was in particularly fine form, and seemed to be ubiquitous, returning the ball immediately he gathered it." And on the same date The Manchester Courier made the following reference: "For the Americans McConaghy gave a fitting conclusion to his magnificent displays in the earlier matches, and, to our mind, stands head and shoulders above any defence man on the team. His catching and throwing is unequalled by any player in this country, and his coolness and finish altogether out of the ordinary. He invariably is in the right place at the right time, and when he goes for the ball in nine cases out of ten he gets it." And the Belfast News of the 10th inst., reported Mr. John Sinclair, Vice-Pres. of the North of Ireland lacrosse club, as saying: "He wished to mention that Mr. McConaghy, whose fine defence play all lacrosse men admired, was himself of Irish parentage. (Applause.) His grandfather was still living at the Giant's Causeway, and he had an announcement to make which he was sure would be received with pleasure. They had arranged an extra attraction for Saturday's match, Mr. McConaghy having kindly agreed to give an exhibition of long throwing, &c." Many of our citizens will remember Mr. Sinclair as one of the Irish lacrosse team who played here some ten or twelve years ago.
