Go with the Majority

The Board of Education held another meeting yesterday and rescinded a former motion to rebuild the High School on the old site. Several other sites were referred to, but none of them filled the bill to the satisfaction of the majority of the members. A committee was appointed to make further inquiry relative to available sites, and said committee are instructed to report at another meeting to be held next Monday. It is hoped that a selection will then be made and that, if not unanimous, the minority will fall in with the majority and work with a determination to have a good High School erected as speedily as possible. The erection of a building should not be endangered by a difference of opinion among trustees as to where the school shall be.

Going to Toronto.

The Rev. C. Sydney Goodman, who has been appointed to the vacant mastership in the Toronto Church School, and to be assistant priest at St. Luke's, both of which positions he enters May 1, preached farewell sermons in his churches of King and Maple on Sunday. The following resolution was unanimously carried at the recent vestry meeting at St. Stephen's, Maple:—"That a cordial vote of thanks be tendered to our highly esteemed rector, Rev. C. Sydney Goodman, for his untiring efforts and zeal for the welfare and success of this part of the parish of King and Maple, and we wish to express our gratitude to him for the same, and our regret that circumstances over which we have no control have caused the severance of the ties between us, which have always been of the most pleasant and successful character."

The whole number is an exceedingly brilliant one and will repay the seeker after either knowledge or pleasure.

Board of Education

The Board of Education met yesterday afternoon. All the members were present with the exception of Mr. Lynett. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A report from the Inspector was read giving an account of his recent visit to the High School. The report showed that the teaching and the discipline of the school was most satisfactory. In a discussion which followed the reading of the report several of the trustees expressed themselves as highly pleased with the standing of the school.

A report was read from the Deputy Minister of Education re plans, and from the Minister of Education recommending the Hopkins site in preference to the old site for the new High School building. Moved by Mr. Clubine, seconded by Mr. McDonald, that the architect be instructed to make the necessary changes suggested by the High School Inspector, for a three master school.—Carried.

The question of a site was then taken up. The chairman reminded the members that it should be discussed without prejudice, that every lot should stand on its merits irrespective of petitions, and he asked that every member give it his best consideration.

Moved by Mr. Newton, seconded by Mr. Harrison, that a former motion to rebuild on the old site be rescinded.—Carried.

Mr. Harrison made a motion suggesting the purchase of the Hopkins property. A committee consisting of Messrs. Newton, McConaghy, Switzer, Naughton and Storey was appointed to make further inquiry in reference to available sites, with the price at which they can be purchased, and report at the regular meeting on Monday next.

Mr. Hutchison moved, seconded by Mr. McNair, that the selection of a site be made forthwith, but it was afterwards withdrawn.

The Board adjourned.
