THE NEW TARIFF.

The cardinal feature of the tariff is the 25 per cent. reduction on British goods and on those of other countries which open their markets to Canadian products.

Protection shall be removed from or lowered, by order in Council, upon industries in which there are trusts or combinations to increase prices.

Iron and steel duties are reduced by from \$1 to \$1 50 a ton and the bounty is increased by \$1 a ton.

All machinery exclusively used in mining enterprises is put on the free list.

Workmen will be benefited by reductions on breadstuffs, flour, wheat and cornmeal.

Manufacturers will be benefited by cheaper iron and other raw materials.

The general effect is to remove specific and substitute ad valorem duties.

Classifications are very much reduced and simplified.

Duties on spirituous liquors is increased by fifteen cents per gallon.

Rice, uncleaned, unhulled or paddy is increased, while the cleaned is left as it was.

The wheat duty is reduced from fifteen cents to twelve cents a bushel, and the duty on wheat flour is reduced from 75 cents to 60 cents per barrel.

Coal oil is cut from six cents a gallon to five cents; fuel oil from three cents to 2 1-2 cents.

Duty on refined sugar is reduced equal to about 22 per cent. on the former protection.

The main body of the tariff as it affects foreign countries is not materially disturbed. In some cases the duties are actually increased as against foreign countries.

The new tariff is the farmer's tariff because:

(1) It reduces the duty on everything the farmer needs.

(2) Protects the farmer from trusts and combines.

(3) Discriminates in favor of the Canadian farmer's best customer.

(4) Helps the stock-raising and dairy interests by putting corn, the farmer's raw material, on the free list.

(5) The duty on axes, scythes, forks, spades, etc. is reduced from 35 to 25 per cent.

(6) Binder twine and barb wire are put on the free list.

(7) The reduction in duty and the change in regulations are equal to a decrease of three cents a gallon on coal oil.

HARD ON TUPPER.

The Toronto World, the junior organ of the Conservative party, continues to make it hot for Sir Charles Tupper and his colleagues who are struggling to hold the party together on the lines laid down when Sir Charles held the reins of power. The first paragraph in The World's leader yesterday read as follows:—

"There is only one hope for the Conservative party and that is in thorough reconstruction. It was reconstruction that the World urged four years ago, when things began to take an ominous look. But that advice was ignored. Ever since the defeat in June last the men who were mainly responsible therefor made a virtue of devising opposition to the Liberals; they were engaged in that business when the Nova Scotia elections came on; they were in that business when the Quebec elections were on. The result in each case has been a Liberal sweep."

The Mail and Empire regards "The Fall of Quebec" as a serious blow to that province. In its leading editorial yesterday it said "The result is not deplorable to Mr. Flynn (the defeated Prime Minister) or for the Conservative party. It is deplorable, however, for Quebec, and for the Dominion." The same journal thought that it was deplorable that the Tupper party should have been routed from the treasury benches on the 23rd of June last. According to the Mail and Empire the country is all going to the dogs.

The result of the general elections in Quebec on Tuesday shows that there is a strong undercurrent of feeling in that province against clerical interference in political affairs. No stronger demonstration is required than the fact that the Liberals have carried the day by about 53 to 20. At dissolution a few weeks ago the above figures reversed would have been nearly correct.

The following headlines in The Toronto World of yesterday told the fate of the Quebec Conservatives in Provincial general elections held the day before:—"Flynn Thrown down," "Is there anything else left for Liberals to take?" "An Avalanche in Quebec," "The Conservative Premier laid low on the Field of Battle." &c. &c.

Our High School.

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL: SIR.—The Board of Education have decided on asking our Council for the sum of three thousand dollars for the erection of our new High School.

Whilst, like the great majority of our village, I am anxious that we should have the High School and a creditable one too while we are about it, as a ratepayer I would like the responsibility of its erection to be as light as possible, on our assessable property, and would suggest for consideration the following proposition:—

For site, erection and equipment of the High School we should have \$5000. We have on hand insurance, \$2000. We shall need \$3000. Obtain a loan of this \$3000 for a period of 20 years at 4 1/2 per cent. Our present assessment as a village is \$161,325. Principal and interest on \$3000 divided over 20 years would amount to nearly 1 1/2 mills on the \$, or about \$1.45 on each thousand, or in other words \$230.63 to meet each year. We have to our credit invested \$800 of our school moneys. As each debenture came due pay it out of this money and its accrued interest. The \$800 would last us nearly four years, saving us from paying a cent out of our own pockets during that time. At the end of the four years if our village increased in population and assessment, the annual levy will become less in proportion, and would scarcely be felt by future ratepayers. The whole of the money would be spent in the village this year, some one would benefit by the outlay, and the future would pay its share.
