BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education met Wednesday afternoon; all the members were present. An open letter was read, signed by Messrs. J. Freck and J. Empringham, expressing their disapproval of the Board expending a large sum of money for the erection of a new High School. The secretary read an agreement signed by Matthew McNair as executor for the Hopkins estate, binding himself to sell to the board the lot on the corner of Yonge and Wright Streets, and buildings thereon, for \$1000, less \$165 raised by subscription, the offer to hold good until July 1st. Dr. Hutchison suggested the advisability of Mr. McNair resigning as school trustee, in order that litigation would not be possible. Motions were afterwards carried, rescinding the resolution asking the council to grant \$1,500 and asking for \$3000 for High School purposes.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Hastings of Boston have been reviewed in these columns that our readers may be interested to learn that during the thirty-two years in which Mr. Hastings has been in the publishing business, he has issued about eight hundred tons of religious literature, besides many tons of Bibles and good books which have been bought, sold and distributed.

FARMERS' INSTITUTES.

Mr. F. W. Hodson, Superintendent of Farmers' Institutes, has issued notices for the annual meeting of the Farmers' Institutes of Ontario. The date for these meetings is Tuesday, June 1, commencing at 1 p. m. in each district. Full information is given in the circular as to the manner in which the annual meeting is to be carried on. Before 1896, the circular observes, the Government grant to each institute was dependent on the report sent to the Department of Agriculture at the close of the year. It now depends on the report given at the annual meeting, a copy of which must reach the Superintendent not later than June 20, 1897. On December 31, 1895, the total institute membership of the Province was 11,020; June 30 1896 the membership was 12,384; although only four months of this year have elapsed, the membership on May 1 was 14,228. From December 1, 1896, to May 1, 1897 about 480 institute meetings were held, the various sessions of which were attended by 110,758 persons. The delegates sent out by the department delivered 2,138 addresses, and local men 852, making the total number of addresses delivered during this period 2,990.

OUR SPRING EXHIBITION.

The following is taken from the posters which are being distributed this week announcing the annual spring exhibition and concert:—The Richmond Hill and Yonge Street Agricultural Society will hold its annual spring exhibition in the driving park, Richmond Hill, on Monday, May 24th, 1897, when awards will be given for Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Dairy Produce, Ladies' Work, Grain, &c., amounting to nearly \$1000. Purses of \$60 each will be offered for an open and a 2.50 trot or pace, in addition to prizes for farmers' trot and running race. Also Bicycle races under C. W. A. rules. At 10 o'clock sharp a football tournament will take place. First competition open to all, for which \$16.50 in cash or goods will be given; second competition open to junior teams for a prize of \$5.50 in cash or goods. Other sports consisting of Foot-racing, Jumping, &c., will take place in the afternoon. The Ancient Order of Foresters of Toronto, under the auspices of Court Clinton, No. 7676, will run an excursion over the Metropolitan St. Ry. to Richmond Hill, for whom special sports will be provided. Richmond Hill band will be in attendance. In the evening a Grand Concert will be given in the Agricultural Hall, for which the following excellent array of talent has been secured: W. E. Ramsay and Harry Rich, the two popular comedians from the Merry-making School; Miss Florence M. Wright, Champion Lady ball-thrower and club swinger of America, serio-comic Vocalist and Mandolinist; Miss Constance Falls, Humorous Elocutionist and dramatic reciter; Mrs. W. E. Ramsay, musical directress. The entertainment to conclude with a screaming farce comedy by the merry-makers.
