The last named, being called on by the chairman, gave an account of the legislation in connection with the York Roads, and and ex plained how the maintenance of Yonge street had been thrown on the municipalities along side which it passes, in spite of protests from the representatives from Markham, Vaughan and other places. This being the case he urged upon the residents of Vaughan to take the matter in hand as Markham had done, and contended that if an accident should happen on Yonge street on account of neglect to keep the road in good repair, that Vaughan would be held responsible from the fact that Markham had made an appropriation and notified the clerk of Vaughan to that effect.

Several other ratepayers present took part in the discussion, and all seemed anxious that a solution would be found by which the roads of the township might be kept in good repair. The general opinion seemed to be that the three divisions should be done away with, and the whole municipality made into one division.
