DOMINION DAY.

The Ladies and friends of the Presbyterian Church, Thornhill, purpose holding a Strawberry Festival, tea and entertainment on the church grounds on Thursday, July 1st, 1897. At 2 o'clock a football competition (open to all) will commence, for which a first-class football will be given to the winners of the prize. No entries taken after 1.30 p. m. Other games will also be provided. The entertainment will consist of addresses by Rev. Dr. Milligan, Toronto; Rev. Mr. Pickett, Willowdale, and Rev. J. W. Morgan of Thornhill. Singing by Mr. Geo. Mowat, Toronto and the Choir. The Thornhill Band will render suitable music during the afternoon. Tea with Strawberries, served from 5 to 7 o'clock. Tickets, 25 cents. Strawberries and cream, ice cream and other delicacies will be served at low rates. The electric cars will make trips every hour to and from the church grounds.

NORTH YORK SCHOOLS.

According to Inspector Davidson's report to the Council, the school population is 7368 of whom 6131 are on the registers. The boys exceed the girls in number by 550. The teachers' number 108, the average salaries being, for males \$374, and for female teachers, \$307. The report says truancy has disappeared in rural schools and in town and village schools it has decreased, where the truancy act has been strictly enforced. In the entrance examinations 45 passed out of 76 in Newmarket High School, 38 out of 57 in Aurora, 35 out of 52 in Richmond Hill, and 7 out of 24 in Sutton Public School. In the leaving examinations all three candidates passed at Newmarket, 6 out of 17 in Aurora, the only candidate in Richmond Hill passed, and 2 out of 12 at Sutton. 17 out of 19 passed the prescribed examination at Newmarket Model School. The whole report shows the schools in the northern inspectorate to be in first-class standing.
