RELIGION IN SCHOOLS.

There appears to be a move in some quarters, principally among the Anglican clergy, to introduce religious instruction in the Public Schools of Toronto. In a school where the parents or guardians of the children all belong to the same denomination, religious exercises are right and proper, but in a mixed school what some people call religion may be designated by others sectarianism. This is sure to lead to trouble and bad feeling, and no good results will be accomplished. Every citizen who pays taxes should receive the same consideration at the hands of the state, and the school curriculum should be arranged in such a way that every child could participate in the course of studies. The programme should be regulated with a view not to separate pupils but to draw them closer together. If good religious men and women are engaged as teachers in the Public Schools, they will lose no opportunity of imparting lessons in morality, temperance, and all that tends to the welfare of mankind. There can be no objection to teaching religion after school hours, but as long as an attempt is made to impart religion to a mixed school just so long will there be heart-burnings and enmity among the members of the various denominations.

The Liberals of North Wentworth have selected a strong candidate for the Ontario Legislature in the person of Mr. A. F. Pirie, editor and proprietor of the Dundas Banner. The number of newspaper men in Parliament is small compared with those from the professions. There are a few clever members in the Local House, however from the fourth estate, among them being Mr. Andrew Pattullo, of the Woodstock Sentinel Review, who was elected in North Oxford upon the retirement of Sir Oliver Mowat from Provincial politics. Mr. Pattullo although a member for little over a year, is already one of the most active members in the House.

THE LIBERAL congratulates the Reformers of North Wentworth upon the choice of their nominee, and hopes to see Brother Pirie a member of the Legislature after the next election. Mr. Pirie is a man of excellent ability, and his well-known wit should be sufficient to cure any fit of the blues.

WOODBIDGE FAIR.

Woodbridge Fair will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. The prize list is an extensive one, a large building will be devoted to the dog show, and every department promises to be full. Music will be supplied both days by the Eglington brass band. The speeding contests in the ring will be as follows: First day—Three year old single horse in harness; single horse that never beat 3 minutes; pony, 13 hands or under, twice round the ring; gentleman's driving horse in harness to buggy of not less than 250 lbs., style and speed to be considered; saddle horse, not less than 15 hands. Second day—Single horse in harness, farmers' premium; single horse in harness that never beat 2.30; single horse in harness, open to all. The above trotting contests will be held on beats, best three in five.

LEG FRACTURED.

Dr. Campbell of Newmarket, met with a severe accident near Maple on Thursday evening. He and Mrs. Campbell were driving to Brampton and on the way called at the residence of County Councillor G. W. High. While driving down the lane a cow collided with a shaft of the buggy, which frightened the horse, causing it to rear and kick. The doctor was kicked in the leg which was fractured in two places. Mrs. Campbell also received a sprained ankle. The doctor was carried to the home of Mr. Geo. Keffer and Dr. Sisley sent for. The patient was made as comfortable as possible, and Dr. Sisley accompanied him to his home in Newmarket the following morning, by Northern railway.

MASONIC FUNERAL.

Thomas Townsend, a highly respected citizen of Maple, died at his residence on Sunday last in the 83rd year of his age. Deceased who was known as an honest and industrious man, was for many years section boss on the Northern Railway, had formerly been an engineer, and, it is said, ran the first engine over the road. A large number of friends assembled at his late residence on Tuesday afternoon to show their last tribute of respect to the departed and to the aged wife who survives him. The funeral was conducted by the Masonic fraternity, of which order deceased had been a member for thirty-six years. He was made a Mason in King, but affiliated with Vaughan Lodge, No. 54, in 1868. Service was conducted at the house by Rev. C. A. Campbell, after which a procession was formed headed by the Richmond Hill band. A large number of Masons were present from Richmond, Blackwood and other lodges. The Masonic ceremony was read by Bro. J. T. Saigeon, W. M., assisted by Bro. Past Master, Dr. Sisley. At the lodge room after the burial a short sketch of the life of departed was given by Bros. Richardson and Smelson.

THE BAND ENTERTAINED.

The Richmond Hill band had one of the pleasantest outings of the season last evening. Accompanied by a few of the citizens they left the village shortly after 7 o'clock, by special car, and after an enjoyable trip, spent the evening at the residence of Mr. Moyes, manager of the Metropolitan Railway, Deer Park. Among those who accompanied the band were Reeve Savage, County Councillor Pugsley, Messrs. F. McConaghy, J. Palmer, J. Brownlee, and T. F. McMahon, and the party were met on the way by ex-Warden Slater and Mr. J. McDougall, county engineer. They were met at the power-house by Mr. Moyes and escorted to his home where a few most enjoyable hours were spent. The band played a number of their choicest selections outside, and in Mr. Moyes' drawing-room a most interesting programme was rendered. Lively choruses were given, and solos sung by Mr. A. S. Savage and Mr. E. Mason, Mr. H. L. Brown presiding at the piano. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Moyes, which were thoroughly enjoyed. Before separating Mr. Moyes thanked the musicians for the entertainment provided, and Mr. E. Mason, on behalf of the band, expressed his appreciation of the hospitality extended by Mr. and Mrs. Moyes. After a few more songs and choruses the party left about 11 o'clock, reaching home shortly after midnight.
