## YORK CO. VS. PICKERING.

The Toronto World of Tuesday contains an article on the York Road question which is misleading. The article states that when the roads were handed over to the minor municipalities five miles in Pickering fell to the share of York township.

We beg to point out that York township has nothing to do with the matter. The quarrel is between the county of York and the township of Pickering. The York County Council at its June session passed a by-law abandoning that part of the Kingston Road (about 2 miles, not 5 as The World says) lying within the limits of the township of Pickering to that municipality. And as Pickering refuses to accept the road, the Legislation committee of York county will meet the Lieut.-Governor in Council this afternoon for the purpose of discussing the by-law. If it was right to force Richmond Hill, Scarboro and other municipalities to accept and maintain the parts of York Roads which run through or alongside their respective municipalities we cannot see how it would be unfair to compel Pickering to do likewise.

It would be wrong to hold Catholics responsible for the utterances of Archbishop Cleary of Kingston. That dignitary has often put his church members to shame by his insults to Protestants, but the mandate read in his church last Sunday was probably the most offensive yet delivered by him. The pastoral forbids Catholics entering non-Catholic edifices to attend either weddings or funerals, and declares that Catholics so offending are guilty of mortal sin and heinous crime. Such intolerance is scarcely conceivable in the closing years of the 19th century.
